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Bolton Selectmen Learn State Policy On Powers of CD Policemen

The questions of whether or not towns having no organized police department, shall have the power to arrest, and whether or not they can be armed, was the subject of an official bulletin of the State Civil Defense Administration recently. The official policy of the SCDA was read at the local Selectmen's meeting last night.

The police policy, approved by the Connecticut Police Chiefs' Assn., provides these five points, among others:

1. The limitation of 10 hours per month for CD Auxiliary Police "on the job" training is eliminated.
2. In towns not having organized police departments, the chief executive authority shall decide if the power of arrest will be given to CD Auxiliary Police.
3. The chief executive authority (as qualified above) shall decide whether CD Auxiliary Police shall be armed.
4. No CD Auxiliary Police may be placed in training, including "on the job" training or on official duty, without authorization in writing.

Sheinwold on Bridge

LEAD DANGEROUS SUIT TO WIN SETTING TRICK

By Alfred Sheinwold

In general, it is dangerous for a defender to lead a suit in which dummy has ace-jack-ten. Such a lead usually helps declarer, rather than your own side. You may be compelled to lead that suit, however, when you desperately need exactly one trick from that suit.

West led a trump, and South won the king in his own hand in order to lead a heart toward dummy. The king of hearts lost to the ace, and East led another trump.

Dummy won with the ten of spades and returned a low trump. East stopped up with the queen of hearts and had to make a crucial bid.

Diamonds Don't Help
A diamond return would help. That would remove the singleton diamond from the dummy. South would be able to ruff the next trick with the ace of trumps and ruff a heart. Then he would get back to dummy with the ace of clubs to discard a club and a diamond on the established heart.

East had to return a club up to dummy's strong holding. West put up the king, and dummy won with the ace. Now South could get back to dummy by ruffing a diamond.

South led to lead a trump to dummy's ace.

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Reappraisal in Detroit Is Public Tiring of the Big Car Binge?

Detroit, Mich.—(AP)—The auto industry is making an agonizing reappraisal of how it must satisfy the American car buyer in the future.

One thing they suspect now is that the biggest, most expensive, most powerful, most chrome-plated, forward-looking, future-looking, space-looking cars ever offered to the public—the 1966 models—are not doing the trick.

Another thing they suspect from their highly accurate consumer research work is that the average potential U.S. car buyer isn't quite sure himself what kind of transportation he wants today.

There are strong indications that the public is about "weary of the big car binge it has been on since World War II and may be about ready to turn to less expensive, less ostentatious, more practical cars.

Devoe's Death Attributed to Own Neglect

Hartford, May 2 (AP)—The auto accident death of a Rockville man was charged to his own negligence today in a coroner's report of the March 1 mishap.

An inquest by Hartford County Coroner Louis W. Schfer revealed that Zane Devoe, 21, who died March 7 in Norwalk Hospital as a result of injuries incurred in an accident in Manchester had been seen in an apparently drunken condition shortly before.

A Manchester service-station attendant testified at the inquest that Devoe had stopped at his station, made a phone call and departed, despite a warning that he should not try to drive.

A quarter of an hour later, the vehicle driven by Devoe struck a large tractor-trailer rig and another car. The coroner's report said that Devoe died from a ruptured left kidney, broken left arm, laceration of the liver and other injuries.

Toward Reality?

A writer in the Christian Science Monitor reports the somewhat encouraging news that most of the scientists who work on nuclear weapons programs are becoming quite convinced that their own endeavor is futile. They consider the possibilities of defense and survival in nuclear war as practically non-existent. They consider the threat of retaliation meaningless. They find no possible route to safety and survival except the prevention of war itself.

They can visualize only one kind of war, which is a war of mutual annihilation. They see the danger that we may have that kind of war increasing steadily. They see nuclear war as the only natural result of the present arms race, if that arms race is not checked. And they see such a war becoming more and more likely if atomic arms get into the hands of some fourth power, or a fifth, or a sixth.

Strangely enough, this is what some of us laymen have been thinking about the possibility of war for some time—namely that it is no longer a possibility, but an impossibility. Strangely enough, this is also what our President has said on occasions now dating back several years.

And strangely enough some of these very scientists whose views this writer claims to be quining are busy at work, making us bigger and better bombs.

The reality we all know we all ignore. We ignore it in favor of the fantasy—that was what General MacArthur himself labeled it as early as 1945—that humanity can fight and survive another war. We ignore what we really know in order to follow dreamers like Dr. Teller and Admiral Strauss who cannot tolerate the horrible, down-to-earth prospect of having war be made impossible, and who keep assuring us that they will find a way out for us, so we can have wars as usual.

But says the Monitor writer in effect, the hard-boiled scientists are getting ready to advance their own convictions. In a show-down with the romantic dreamers. And other observers in Washington, say that the realistic view has already progressed so far as to make a conquest of Secretary Dulles, so as to convince him that disarmament is something he must seek rather than something he must evade, and that soon the President himself is going to be forced to choose between the realistic truth he himself has often proclaimed, which classifies war as impossible, and the optimistic dream that, if we can only perfect a clean bomb, and reorganize the Defense Department, the institution of war can be preserved.

These scientists in their laboratories are repeatedly making the hard and unpleasant discovery that we have to find a way to live in the same world with the Russians, under a system of law and order which shall be bigger than either of us. Survival thus becomes a grim and forbidding prospect. But if we have to face it, let's face it. Let's stop living by our illusions.

Our Latest "Day"

May 1, this year, had a new title. The fact that the new title for the day was not widely known, and that observance of the new meaning of the day was almost fully absent were not strange at all—not when we consider that the proposed meaning for the new day happened to be the only formula by which future human existence on this earth can be preserved. The really important things have a habit of slipping up on us like that, and getting past us without notice. If it were the day for the release of some more stars' love letters, on the other hand, we would all be on the alert. Yet May 1 this year was, by proclamation of President Eisen-

hower—try and find even the proclamation—Law Day, the first "Law Day in our history." The origin of this new day on the national scene can apparently be traced to a meeting between the convictions of two men.

One of these was President Eisenhower himself, who, in a memorable moment in the Suez crisis, when the question was one of whether we should invoke United Nations procedure against our friends, told his own people and the world that the only course the world could follow was that of peace and justice through United Nations law.

The second individual involved was Charles Rhyne, who took office as president of the American Bar Association last summer. He was new to us, too, until we read in a Herald Tribune editorial on "Law Day" the statement that Rhyne, ever since his assumption of office, "has devoted his time to spreading a single concept: world peace through world law."

Fathers and Sons

An international conference of supposed experts on Soviet Russia held a conference last weekend, at the Alden House in Harriman, N. Y. And this conference allotted to itself the pleasant and relaxing task of discussing "tensions" inside Russia.

One of the most interesting tensions discussed was that of a new kind of "class struggle" which involves the question of whether or not Russian citizens who presumably because of their own ability, have won privileged positions in Russian society today shall be able to pass on to their children the advantages of such positions to their children.

Theoretically, the child of the poorest and humblest Russian should have his equal chance to rise to the top. And that has indeed happened, with the first generation of life in the Russian revolution, the way having been cleared, of course, by the destruction of the old aristocracy.

But now the sons of peasants have achieved high estate, and good salaries, and good living conditions. They wear white collars, and they can afford the better things of life for themselves, and for their families. Those sons of peasants who have risen to the top comprise a new elite in Russian society. The question is: does their status become hereditary? Can they pass the advantages they have won on to their own children? Or do these children have to start all over again, on their own, and on a basis of equality with the children of peasants who have remained peasants?

If such equality is to be the rule, how enforce it? How do you take away from a child the advantage it may have derived just from the atmosphere in which it grew up?

These Russian parents who have made the grade themselves are, apparently, just like other parents elsewhere. They want to hand on the gains they have made. They want to excuse their own children from the struggle they themselves had to make. Part of their satisfaction in their own success in climbing up is the thought, that they did it not only for themselves, but for their children.

And when they are threatened with the possibility that the Communist theory works out properly and realistically, their own children are ready to see any kind of ordinary workers and farmers, they behave, according to report, just like parents anywhere. They are ready to see any kind of ordinary worker or farmer, they want to see that their own children remain on the new higher level of life. It is suggested they themselves try to see that their children qualify for the advanced education which alone can lead to white collar jobs. When they fail they are unhappy themselves. When they succeed, others are jealous and resentful.
