George Beveridge, 36, reporter for the Washington, D. C. Evening Star, for local reporting without edition time pressure. He was cited for a series of eight Sunday articles on urban development problems in the capital.

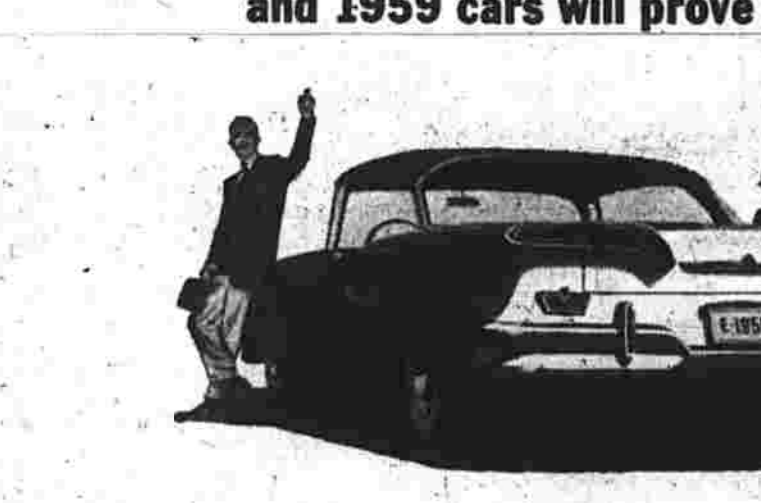

**Nixon's Travel And Travel**  
 Vice President Nixon has been traveling in a South America which is not altogether as well known as it is. His travel is also travel.

In Argentina, installing the first democratically elected president since the overthrow of Peron, he was able to speak of democracy and of the United States' hatred of dictatorship. There, surviving Peronists heckled him.

In Uruguay, perhaps the most settled true democracy on the continent, he was able also to speak of freedom and democracy. And there he did his best to answer the question of why, if we believed in freedom and democracy, we did business with dictators. He had to say that for us to discriminate against dictators among our good neighbors would amount to interference in the internal affairs of other countries.

After Argentina, he went on to Paraguay. There the condemnation of dictatorship and the glowing references to freedom and democracy had to disappear from his speeches, because in Paraguay there was a dictatorship, and because there his normal South American neighbor might have constituted interference in the internal politics of a good neighbor.

But it was in Paraguay that he received the most generous welcome from the people themselves. They crowded around him, in tears as they touched him. They whirled and shouted the word freedom. They made efforts, in spite of the police, to hand him petitions setting forth their own threats of freedom. Amid such scenes, Vice President Nixon had to keep the stiff diplomatic lip, pretending not to hear too clearly, from the people of Paraguay, the principles he himself had gone to South America to represent.

One can believe that this was a painful experience for Mr. Nixon himself, and one can guess, too, that other people in South America will notice that his glowing words were tailored to fit the circumstances, when he got to Paraguay.

But the trouble is that it is hard to figure out the alternative should he as an official guest have become Ambassador Burt and denounced the government which was his host. Should we pretend that Paraguay does not exist, because we don't like its form of government? Unfortunately, defiance of the United States can become a popular asset for almost any South American dictator. Because the alternatives are you come back to what we have to try to do, which is to be polite as if the politics of other peoples is not our business.

**The Role Of The Clean Bomb**  
 It began to appear that all our long nonsense about "clean bombs" was not quite as nonsense as it had sounded. We are not, at least, as often claimed, experimenting on behalf of all humanity, so that it can have the privilege of fighting a nuclear war with fewer millions of innocent casualties. Now is the passion for the clean bomb entirely a passion on the part of those who are willing to do anything—even clean up a bomb—order to preserve the institution of war.

Rather, we judge from discussion in the British press which seems to be more frank and informed than our own, the so-called clean bomb is being sought and developed for one special military mission—that of being the anti-missile missile which will intercept other nuclear weapons over our own territory. The primary reason for wanting the anti-missile missile to be a clean job is that it would be exploded over our own territory, so that any "dirty" in it might come down to harm us first.

In its use, its function of saving the lives of millions of innocent civilians would apply to the whole world.

**Connecticut Yankee**

One William J. 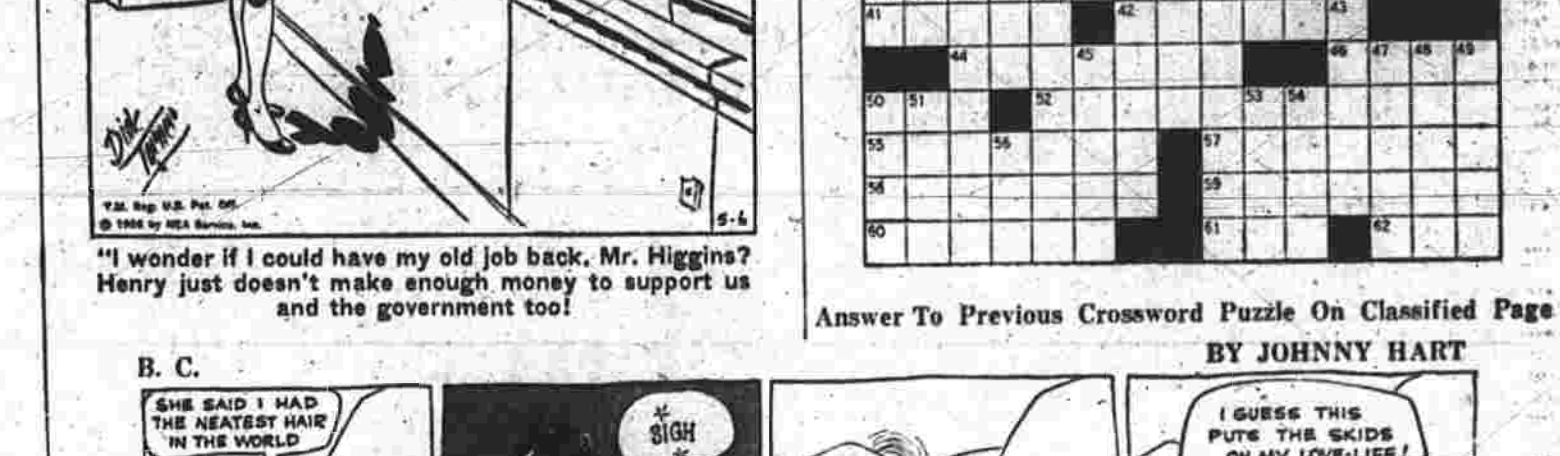
