President Eisenhower wants authority to spend foreign aid money in Iron Curtain countries but wants it separate from the Mutual Security Bill

Knowland himself is opposing an amendment, offered by Sen. John F. Kennedy (D-Mass) to put into the Foreign Aid Bill a section allowing the President to spend in satellite countries if he finds it would help or encourage them on a course independent of Moscow.
