London, June 16 (AP)-The Soviet ambassadors to the United States, Britain and France have been summoned to Moscow, presumably for consultations on East-West summit meeting and nuclear

arms negotiations.

Ambassador Sergei Vinogradov flew to Moscow yesterday, the Soviet embassy in Paris announced. He left a day after conferring with French Premier Charles de Gaulle, who was given a letter from Soviet Premier Nikita Khrushchev, Jacob Malik left his London post by flane shortly after it was re-vealed that Mikhail Menshikov had slipped out of Washington and headed for the Sovier expital.

## U.S. Embassy Families Move From Lebanon

Beirut, June 16 (AP)-American families had the go-ahead to move out of Lebanon today as the anti-government rebels kept up a determined, bloody stand before U.N. Secretary Dag Hammarskjold arrives to direct his international team of observers. Bitter fighting broke out in the capital Saturday and continued yesterday until government security forces pinned down the insurgents in their strongholds at the center of Beirut. Heavy shooting stopped by noon, but sporadic vi ing and bombing were heard the rest of the day.
