Washington, July 1 (AP)-Secretary of State Dulles asserted today the United States refuses to pay political blackmail for the release of Americans held captive in East Germany and Cuban Rebel territory.

The government hopes to obtain release by other means, he told a news conference. Dulles also said that only as a last resort would the intervention of U.S. military forces in Lebanon be desirable

It is much better for the Lebanese themselves, working through Arab nations, to find a solution, Dulles said. He added that he doubts whether it is practical-as the

Pro-western Lebanese government has suggested-for U.N. teams in Lebanon to try to seal off the border with Syria. More than 40 American citizens have been kidnaped by Cuban rebels. Flow of Gold Overseas Boosts U.S. Recession

New York, July 1 P. The flow of gold from the United States to other lands — mostly to Great Britain, Japan and The Netherlands — can put big city banks in a bind, And of late that's adding to the Federal Reserve Board's task of keeping money easy instead of tight.

Some \$11\frac{1}{2}\$ billion from the U.S. gold hoard have gone overseas since the start of the year. Much of that outgo his meant at least a temporary drop in deposits for these banks, and hence a loss of reserves available for making loans. That is one reason the Federal Reserve has just made its largest purchase of U.S. Treasury \$1-day bills in two years to relieve the strain on the big banks. currency.

The board's official position is that it's glad friendly nations can build up their depieted gold reserves. But practically, it has had to counteract the flow so that the hanks have plenty of money to lend during the recession. Otherwise the slump might start snowballing.

This is the way the flow of gold affects the U.S. banking system:

The largest share of non-Communist held gold is in the United States. Central banks of other nations have the right to buy it at \$35 an ounce, although American sitizens do not.

When other nations get their hands of dollars through international trade they frequently deposit them with either U.S. commercial banks or with the Federal Reserve Banks, or they buy up U.S. Treasury securities.
