HIGHTOWER Washington, July 23 (P)-Moscow objected sharply today western suggestions for a U.N. summit meeting to discuss Middle East crisis, but stopped short of saying Premier Chrushchev would not accept. The suggestions were made in varying forms yesterday in the western powers' individual replies to Khrushchev's own suggestion for a 5-power summit meeting outside the United

The initial Moscow reaction came in a commentary by the government newspaper Izvestia, which said that "everyone knows the USA can rely on a mechanical majority in the Security Council.

The commentary broadcast by Moscow Radio also accused this country of trying to prevent the 5-power conference Khrushchev proposed. But it did not rule out Russian acceptance of the western proposal. In advance of that, U.S. officials

said they expected Khrushchev to accept, but to attach conditions which the United States and its Allies may find unacceptable.
