

# **Ready for Meeting** In UN or Elsewhere

London. July 31 (P)-Prime Minister Macmillan today asked Soviet Premier Nikita Khrushchev to attend a summit meeting on the Middle East Aug. 12-in New York or elsewhere. He proposed discussions both informally and under United Nations auspices. He said he would personally attend the Aug. 12 meeting

and added: "I have no reason to suppose that the President of the United States would not be willing to go either to Geneva or New York."

The prime minister read to the House of Commons the text of a letter which he had arranged to have delivered to the Soviet premier in Moscow only a short time before he suggested that permanent representatives on the Security Council-which would include Nationalist China-should decide on the meeting place. If this meeting is agreed
