Walklight Test **Costly, Schendel Tells Directors**

Police Chief Herman O. Schenlel last night again adviced the Board of Directors against - installing walklights on Main S etween the Center and Charter Oak St., and he said that such oject, would cost the town \$13

Earlier this summer the Board instructed Schendel to investigati he possibility of installing a air gle walklight at Main and Oak Sts. The chief, at that time, advocated that walklights should not be used at all, and that just one light would disrupt the entire traffic flow cycle. Last night he reported back to the Board that he had contacted fficials from two walklight man ufacturing firms and he said tha their opinions corresponded with his. "They told me that one walk light would interfere with progressive traffic on Main and that lights at all of the

tersections would cost \$13,000," the chief reported. He added that about 75 per cent of the cost would be for the installation. Schendel said that both firms agreed with him that the present system on Manchester's Main St. worked very nicely and there was no danger to pedestrians.

While advising against walk-lights, Schendel has also suggested that the town turn its efforts to improving street lighting and of street parking. He has also report-ed that the State Traffic Commis-sion, in surveys here, had found that the number of pedestrian crossing at the Main St. intersec-tions did not warrant the use of walklight system.
