Washington, Aug. 29 (AP)-The highly-charged Little Rock school integration issue hung suspended today after a Supreme Court decision to delay a showdown for at least two weeks. After hearing more than three

hours of arguments in extraordinary session yesterday, the nine Justices went behind closed doors and decided to hold another hearg on Sept. 11.
