Peiping Says China Not at War with U.S.

Warsaw, Poland, Sept. 18 (P)-U.S. and Chinese Commu-nist ambassadors met for two hours today to continue probing their countries' plans in the flaming Formosa Strait. Shortly before U.S. Ambassador Jacob Beam and Wang Ping-nan, the Red Chinese ambassador, conferred for the second time on easing Far East tension, Peiping Radio broadcast a refusal to agree to a cease-fire in the offshore islands as long as the talks go on.


United Nations, N. Y., Sept. 18 (AP)-Secretary of State Dulles declared today that the Chinese Communist campaign against Formosa "poses a grave threat, with ominous im-plications." He called for a prompt cease-fire. Dulles made his comment in a major policy address before the U.N. General Assembly as that 81-nation body opened general debate in its 13th regular session.

He expressed hope the talks now * in progress in Warsaw between U.S. and Chinese Communist Am-bassadors would end the current Taipei Reports crisis, but reserved the right to bring the problem to the U.N. if the talks appeared headed for fail-

Krishna Menor urged full debate at the curcent assembly session on the high controversial issue of giving China's seat to the Peiping The U.S. proposal was aimilar

to motions adopted by the assembly in previous years. There ap-peared no doubt that it would be approved again this time. Lodge told the committee "this year, of all years, is not the time"

consider ousting Nationalist China and seating the Chinese Communists, He made no direct reference to the Chinese Communist attacks on Formosa, but spoke only of "recent developments" in the Far East. Nationalist China's T.F. Tsiang
