THE RIBICOFF RECORD As Seen By The Press

"A Man of Action and Decision..."



"Gov. Ribicoff believes in direct action and also in direct contact with people who want to seek his aid..."

Excerpts from an article by Keith Schonrock in the Hartford Courant, February 13, 1955, shortly after Abe Ribicoff took office.

In the six weeks he has been head of the state, Gov. Ribicoff has succeeded in tearing away much of the red tape which has surrounded high level governmental operations for many years.

"Many people and groups have brought problems to Gov. Ribicoff in the last six weeks. Gov. Ribicoff has not solved all of them but neither has he wrapped them in red tape. He has acted speedily in most instances to set wheels in motion and to get answers at least to preliminary questions right on the spot..."

"One faculty Gov. Ribicoff has demonstrated, which also aids in the more even flow of governmental business, is his insistence that one problem be handled at a time and everything be done to clear it away as soon as possible..."

"Gov. Ribicoff puts it this way: 'I don't like to have a lot of balls in the air at one time. I would rather take up first things first and get them out of the way.'"

"Gov. Ribicoff believes in direct action and also in direct contact with people who want to seek his aid... While previous governors shunted most callers to one or another office aid and handled only a relatively few interviews personally, Gov. Ribicoff has maintained an open-door policy and practically everyone who comes into his office gets to see him personally."

"One might think that because of this the office is jammed and crowded. It is not. The atmosphere there is one of easy, relaxed, but efficient business. The beauty of it all is that virtually everyone, including Republican legislators who often drop in to discuss issues with the Governor, goes away satisfied. They have at least seen and talked to the boss..."

each political poster or sign posted on public property. He, however, made a telephone call to Democratic Congressional nominee Emilio Q. Daddario of Hartford, suggesting that he take down a sign which is on state property along Route 15 near the Charter Oak bridge on the Hartford side.

Asked by newsmen about signs in the same area in behalf of GOP gubernatorial opponent, and Republican Congressman Edwin E. May Jr., the Democratic governor said that he was "embarrassed."

Pressed again as to whether he would act on this score, the Governor had nothing to say. The issue was raised in a formal complaint to the Governor from Harvey R. Fuller, superintendent of schools in Waterbury.

Fuller said that he had seen signs for both Zeller and Daddario on state property along the Hartford South Meadows, a highway which cuts through the city. He said that he had referred the matter, said that he checked and found the signs to be on state property as claimed.

Governor Ribicoff said he had told Democratic State Chairman John M. Bailey sometime ago that "it is my hope that no Democrat candidates" would post signs on state property.

The governor said his comment at that time followed a State Public Utilities Commission warning against placing signs on utility poles.

Republicans State Chairman Clarence F. Baldwin, queried on the subject today, said that he would "suggest" to Zeller and May that they remove such signs.

Motorists have observed in recent weeks that a large number of campaign posters have been tacked to telephone poles and guardrails on public property along highways.

It has been going on for years with apparently little or no attempt to enforce the law prohibiting their use as well as firing candidates.

held that the superintention of such a corporation does not excuse a state institution from compliance with the 14th Amendment rights.

"It is clear from all the facts that the proposed action here is part of a plan to bring about the segregation of Negro school children in violation of the existing orders of this court," Rogers asked Judge Miller to instruct the school board that the proposed lease would violate court orders.

On the other hand, Rogers said that if the court ruled the lease should be issued, the court should instruct the board the lease "must be on terms which will explicitly require the operator to permit the Negro students eligible under the school board's plan to attend Central High School."

The government memorandum stated that "the interest of the United States of America as amici curiae (friend of the court) in this proceeding is its responsibility that the orders of United States courts be complied with."

Negro and white leaders fought yesterday in Little Rock and in Chicago's South Side.

as an action likely to discourage needed capital investment.

Raymond Harris, Harvard professor who acted as chairman of the group, said Eisenhower still believes in more bold facts of hard work, thrift and personal responsibility.

"I am hoping that one effect of the recession will be less votes for the Republicans. They certainly ought to be punished for their unwise policies."

A career government economist said, meanwhile, that bad weather early this year made the recession show up in government statistics, as worse than it was.

Evan Clegg, commissioner of labor statistics, said the seasonal adjustment of production and other figures did not take into account the winter's cold weather and heavy snows.

Decline for the early months of 1958 has been the underlying economic factor.

Recession Over? Rayburn, a chief economic adviser to leaving his job convinced that recovery from the recession will be achieved during the first half of 1959.

If it continues its present course, the storm will hit the mainland at the coastal point, where South and North Carolina meet. So far, there has been nothing to indicate any deviation from that course.

But, at the present forecast, some nine miles an hour, heavy hours would elapse before even the fringe winds could approach the coast.

Gordon Dunn, chief storm forecaster, reported that "the factors which could govern Helene's future course are so evenly balanced right now that we must simply wait and watch. Any predictions now of its future course would be pure guesswork."

A balloon-borne radio beacon was dropped into the calm eye of the hurricane yesterday shortly after noon. It was timed to destroy itself at 9:30 p.m. and bureau officials said that no transmissions were heard from it.

The latest reports from ships showed no gale winds within 200 miles of the eye today.

Little by encouraging little, Americans are becoming aware of the fact that some of the problems of our time demand not merely their personal thought but their participation. It is a time to cast into the balance such contributions as, in more casual times, might be thought to be insignificant.

"Why should I bother?" That is, perhaps, the normal query, to himself, of an individual dumpy where, which demands action from somebody.

Now, perhaps, a new question is beginning to form itself in more and more minds. Perhaps it goes as follows:

"How can I fail to do what little I can?"

The two questions are the difference between inertia and initiative.

It was a great courageous initiative, in which their own future careers were placed on risk. Because they finally came to consider that great contribution necessary, which came upon the 61 Little Rock students who refused to obey the order of the Governor Faubus and the seeming mood of their community with their challenge to his private school device for desegregating Little Rock.

It was a much smaller initiative, carrying almost no risk of professional or social career, which was demonstrated when the executive committee of the Hartford County Bar Association decided to send these 61 Little Rock students a telegram of praise and encouragement. In fact, this gesture would normally not even have been thought of, or, if suggested, it would have encountered the normal inertia question of "Why should we bother?"

But, in this instance, the question of why a Hartford County organization should bother to throw its small ounce of praise and encouragement into the national conflict centered at Little Rock was obviously not phrased that way at all. If it was a little thing to do, it was now important that it be done. The borderline between inertia and initiative, between not doing something that might prove insignificant, and doing whatever could be done no matter how insignificant it might be, had been crossed.

Overnight Trips Cut As Class Activities

Principal Christen B. Seybold has announced that the Regional District 8 Board of Education has voted unanimously at its last meeting to eliminate overnight trips as a part of class activities.

In its stead they favored a well-organized group of activities which could be planned for Senior Week, with consideration of day trips to Boston or New York or both.

The board's action was not repeated previously since it was taken in executive session.

RHAM High School will not be the only one in the area that does not have class trips. Other high schools with a similar policy are Manchester, Windham, Middlebury, Glastonbury, Rockville, Woodrow, Wilson, Cromwell and Norwich.

Considerable attention was given to the matter, Seybold said, after he asked the board for a definite policy on overnight trips. Among the items considered were the fact that the graduating class at RHAM will include between 100 to 150 students within two or three years. This year's class has only 45 students which entails raising \$4500, based on an average of \$100 per person for a class trip, exclusive of clothing, luggage and souvenir money. Consequently, in two or three years the senior class would be required to raise from \$10,000 to \$15,000 for their trip.

It was pointed out that this would involve a continuous money-raising campaign from one year's end to the next in the three communities. Andover, Hebron and Marlborough.

Even though the present senior class will be extremely disappointed, the administration and the Board of Education felt that it had to start somewhere to face the problem, which is one of many confronting them, he added.

Seybold has met with a group of seniors at their request to answer questions concerning the situation.

Something Strictly for the Girls

 Certain diets appeal to what Americans call the "girls" be they 15 or 30. And entertain the girls we all do—whether they come to a committee meeting, a shower for the bride or expectant mother, or a going-away party for a friend who's taken to travel.

One offering you can count on is food that for women is a buffet lunch or afternoon tea. The savory fillings and decorate it imaginatively and it may make friends and influence cooks.

You might like to impress your guests with a hand-flavored consommé and crisp crackers. The herb does wonders for the soup. For every five half-cupful servings, use one can (1 1/2 cups) of condensed consommé and one soup can full of water. Knife-shred three large fresh basil leaves, add to the soup and simmer for 10 minutes or until there is a pronounced herb flavor. Strain the consommé and if you like, add a tablespoon or two of dry sherry before in small portions.

Desert on this menu can be a combination of fresh fruit and thin crisp cookies.

Party Luncheon Loaf
 Ingredients: 1 loaf unsliced white bread, butter, pimiento-stuffed olives, cured egg filling, sliced olives, deviled ham filling, 1 package of 18 small round cookies.
 Method: Trim crusts from bread; slice loaf lengthwise into 4 layers. Spread each layer with soft butter. Spread bottom layer with pimiento-stuffed filling; top with second bread layer and spread with egg filling. Arrange row of stuffed olives down center of this layer; place next layer on top and spread with ham filling. Top with remaining bread layer, buttered-side down. Wrap loaf firmly in aluminum foil or waxed paper. Chill 1 hour and "roll" loaf with cream cheese moistened with milk or mayonnaise; chill until serving time. Use canned mushroom slices, crisp greens, cucumber wheels or other condiments to make loaf presentable.

Pimento-Nut Filling: Mix 1-1/2 cup chopped nuts (almonds or pecans or walnuts) and 2 dried mushrooms with one 3-ounce package softened cream cheese. Add 2 tablespoons mayonnaise and salt and pepper to taste.

Cured Egg Filling: Chop 4 hard-cooked eggs and add mayonnaise to mixture. Season with 1 teaspoon each salt and curry powder and a dash of pepper.

Deviled Ham Filling: Blend one 4-ounce can deviled ham with a 1/2 cup mayonnaise, season with prepared mustard and dash of pepper.

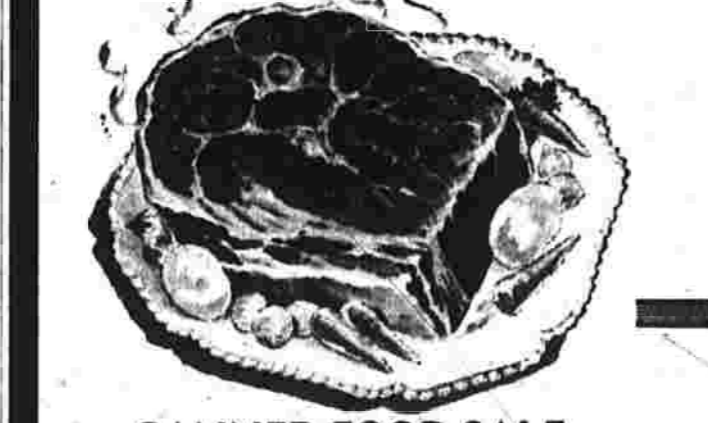

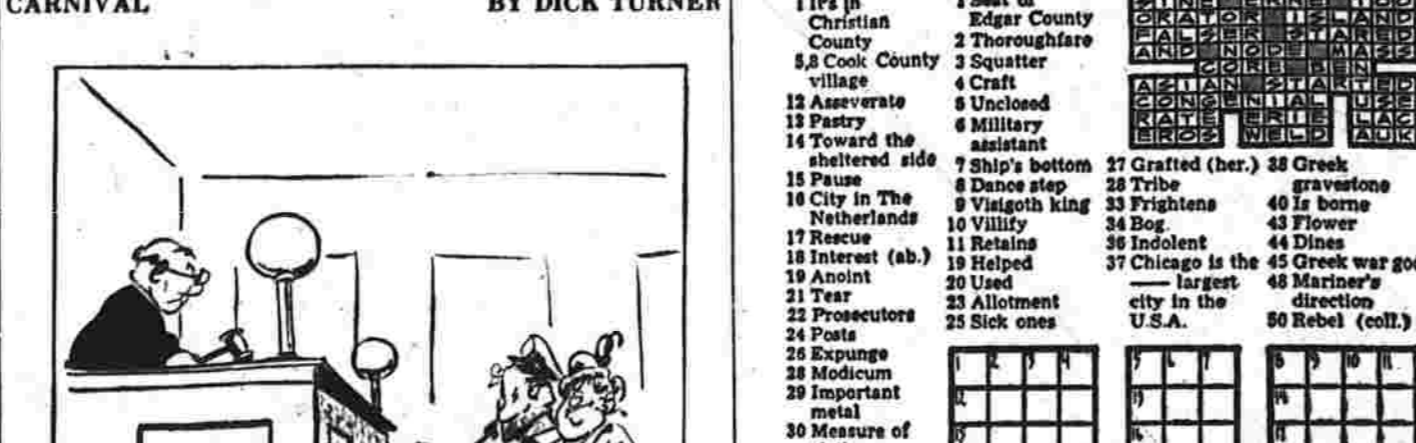
