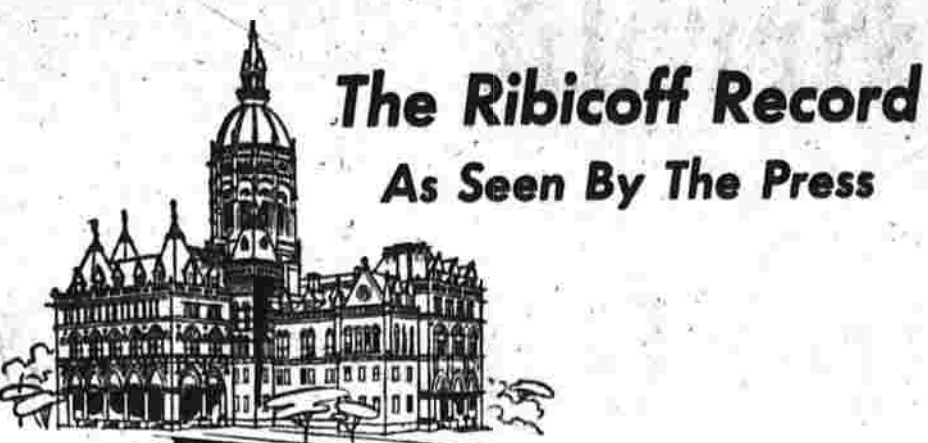

## Deep River New Era Endorses Ribicoff for Governor

"Historically The New Era has supported candidates for office who were Republican nominees generally. Over its four-score and four years of existence we find only scarce evidence of the paper's support of Democratic Party nominees for Governor of Connecticut.

"In the face of this, it has been doubly difficult for us to come to a decision to support a Democratic nominee this year. But after a good deal of soul-searching we have come to the conclusion that we must do so. ### Sheinwold on Bridge

STEARL NINTH TRICK AT EARLHART MOMENT

When bridge players talk about the hand they played at the top of the auction, they usually refer to it as a "trick." That's why the hand shown today has been a favorite for several years.

Jan Wolhin, the great Swedish expert, held the South cards. Affectionately known to European experts as "the fat boy," Wolhin weighs about twice as much as the average player. He denies, however, that he also bids twice as much.

In today's hand, nobody would criticize Wolhin for overbidding. However, it would be just as wrong to call him an overbidder, as long as he managed to make his contract.

West needed the queen of hearts, and Wolhin won in his hand with the king. After the short normal pause for thought, Wolhin gravely held the king of clubs from his hand.

At this point in the story, get ready to shed a tear or two for poor West. How could West lead another club? That time you'll get another chance later. But first you'll have a better idea of why.

No second chance. This time you'll have a second chance to take a club trick. Having said that, the club trick is abandoned the suit, and went after the diamonds. He gave up five diamonds, two hearts, one spade, and one club.

If he had gone after the diamonds first, the defenders would knock out the ace of hearts, discovering what a ace suit they had. When South ever got around to the club suit, West would surely take the first club and lead another heart. Wolhin had to steal his club trick before the defense knew what the hand was all about.

Partners open with one diamond, and the next player passes. You

### Bolton Budget Summary Set; 39 Mill Rate Predicted

The proposed budget for the fiscal year ending Sept. 30, 1959, is available for the town's new fiscal year is available for the Board today for its action by township.

The budget, approved by the Board of Finance at its meeting Sept. 15, will be voted on at the annual town meeting, Monday, Oct. 13, at 8 p.m.

Copies will be distributed at the meeting.

The summary of the budget estimates it will be necessary to raise \$244,800 in property taxes during the 1958-59 fiscal period. Estimated total figure, liquor licenses,

which brought to \$4,883.33 a year ago, are estimated at \$2,000 for the next year.

Total ordinary expenditures, including temporary borrowing, are listed at \$500,000. The education budget accounts for \$228,700 of the figure. General government expenditures are \$119,400. Public safety (the department and civil defense) totals \$5,622.

The figure for highway maintenance, including snow removal, is \$45,000. Bond payments total \$30,000. Interest on loans is listed at \$8,000. The total ordinary expenditure figure also includes an estimated \$12,882 to the reserve fund.

The capital outlay proposal totals \$13,500. This includes \$500 for the purchase of a new car for the Community Hall Improvement Committee, \$3,250 for the reevaluation

and \$600 for additional street signs, a home and brush for road work. Proposed new equipment expenditures at the elementary school total \$7,000.

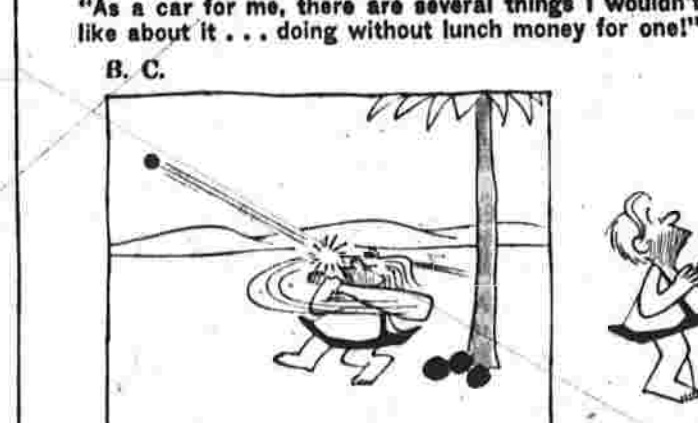
