By THE ASSOCIATED PRESS The federal governmen said today the Little Rock School Board's leasing plan for opening the city's high schools on a segregated basis is invalid. The government said this in e

motion filed with the U.S. 8th Circuit Court of Appeals in SL Louis. Filing as amicus curlae Latin for friend of the court, the overnment supported the Nation al Association for the Advancement of Colored People, which has asked for an injunction forbidding the leasing of the schools to the Little Rock Private School Corp. The 25-page brief said "It is now as plain as day that

here is no alternative to compliance with the law, and that no schemes or devices for operating mublic schools on a segregated basis can hope to succeed The government said it was

high time for the courts "to call halt to any further dilatory and structionist actions which have no legal sanction but which can nonetheless gause delay and prodace needless further litigation." The government asserted U.S. District Judge John Miller had the power to grant an injunction against the school hoard preventing the leasing to the private or ganization. The NAACP has petiioned for this injunction.
