Pope Reported Slightly Better

Castel Gandolfo, Italy, Oct. 7 (AP)—Pope Pius XII had a slight return of fever today after a surprising rally from a stroke. But a medical bulletin said his condition continued generally satisfactory.

Castel Gandolfo, Italy, Oct. 7 (AP)—Pope Pius XII rallied today. He was lucid. His fever abated and his respiration was normal. He ate solid food. The 82-year-old head of the Roman Catholic Church, felled yesterday by a cerebral stroke, recognized persons in his sickroom and spoke a few words.

"There are no signs of motor deficiency," a medical bulletin said. This indicated that the paralytic paralysis which accompanied the stroke had abated.

When his temperature was taken, the Pope himself removed the thermometer from his mouth to read it.

Physicians said he ate cereal, broths and shredded chicken.

A medical bulletin indicated the Pope's tremendous continuing resistance to his second serious illness in four years.

There were cautious expressions of hope he could recover.

One of his doctors said at noon that if his condition continued to improve further medical bulletins might be postponed until tomorrow.

The Pope had recovered from a kidney block, which for a time had threatened dangerous complications.

Janice Lashes Nassau, Roars Into Open Seas

Miami, Fla., Oct. 7 (AP)—Hurricane Janice dealt the honeymooners of Nassau in the Bahamas a stinging blow and headed northeast into the open Atlantic today. Heavy weather broke ships against rocks in Nassau harbor and killed one man.

Carrying top winds of 75 m.p.h., the hurricane was located at 8 a.m. about 30 statute miles east of Nassau.

Forecasters looked for Janice to continue moving toward the north-northeast away from the United States at 11 m.p.h. during the next 12 hours. Some buildup was expected.

Gale warnings were displayed from Cape Hatteras, N.C., south to New Beach, Fla., for easterly winds 20 to 35 m.p.h. on the coast and up to 30 m.p.h. at short distance off shore.

Tides were expected to run two to three feet above normal in the storm area and some flooding was expected, especially at high tide.

Janice left a Nassau skipper downed, several boats lost and destroyed and unestimated damage.

Driving across Nassau harbor, Janice carried peak winds of 60 m.p.h.

A 15-foot sailing dinghy with one man aboard plunging and heavy water and sank within seconds. Wreckage said the skipper disappeared. Customs and police abandoned their search for the body after one hour.

The Rattles II, a 38-foot Marconi-hulled yacht, was broken on rocks a mile west of the Nassau shopping district. Jack Christie of Nassau, the owner and skipper, got safely ashore.

Communications were damaged and definite reports were not available immediately from the outer islands.

D. H. Burrows, acting chief for the Out Isles of commissioner, said Dummore town on Harbour Island and Spanish Wells both off the northern tip of Eleuthera, were believed hardest hit.

On New Providence island where Nassau is located, winds toppled trees and power lines. Some casualties in Nassau were without electricity for more than 12 hours.

Police reported many cars damaged. Public works department crews were busily through the night clearing debris.

Troops Quell Mob In Chehab's Village

BEIRUT, Oct. 7 (AP)—A shouting mob of several hundred today attempted to grab control of the coastal village where President Fuad Chehab lives. Lebanese security forces quashed the rioting with armored cars and infantrymen.

The mob erected barricades inside and outside the village and stone castles tried to run the gauntlet.

Five armored cars with their sirens howling and machine guns at the ready roared up together with three and a truck carrying several dozen infantrymen.

"There is no remaining mob," a source at gunpoint in rebel headquarters said. "There were no more."

Israelis Claim Good Neighbor Action Lacking

United Nations, N. Y., Oct. 7 (AP)—Israeli Foreign Minister Golda Meir said today "a good neighbor policy is not being applied in the Middle East" despite the U.N. General Assembly's Aug. 21 resolution calling for one.

She told the Assembly in its general debate that if the policy were being followed there would be no blockade for radio and press in the Arab countries and the Arab countries would have ended their economic boycott of Israel.

"Nor," she declared, "would there be anti-charter incitement against Israel by the Arab representatives from the very platform from which only six weeks ago they exhorted all member states to join the Arab boycott of Israel."

She also applauded Soviet Foreign Minister Andrei A. Gromyko's statement in an emergency session that Israel should be abolished. Their countries joined eight other Arab countries in sponsoring the good neighbor resolution, adopted unanimously in an emergency session. Mrs. Meir held it "required all states to respect the liberty and independence of all other states in the Arab non-Arab, in the Middle East."

She said "the will of a single country determined by every method to impose its dictatorial authority on its neighbors" helped bring on the emergency session and demanded vigilance of all who valued peace.

The session was called to consider Lebanon's and Jordan's complaints that the United Arab Republic was interfering in their affairs—the grounds on which they invited in American and British troops.

Mrs. Meir approved Secretary of State Dulles' proposal for regional economic development.

Lifer Will Be Released from State Prison

Hartford, Oct. 7 (AP)—Forty-four years ago, a girl and a boy ran away from their New York home. They lived together, a few days, at a cottage on Candlewood Lake near Danbury.

The girl, 15-year-old Josephine Medina, told the boy he must marry her. The boy, 16-year-old William E. Sanders, grew angry. He shot the girl, buried her in the basement and burned the cottage to the ground.

The death was one of Connecticut's most dramatic last-minute miscarriages of justice. Sanders was subsequently arrested, because he seemed to know too much about the identity of the body. In 1944, he pleaded guilty to second degree murder, and he started a life imprisonment sentence in State Prison.

Yesterday, Sanders asked the State Pardon Board for mercy. He is 32 years old, and there is a ray in his hair.

Sanders said he completed his education while at the prison. He has mastered four foreign languages. He has raised his intelligence quotient 30 points above the "normal" 100.

He has quanted seven gallons of blood to the Red Cross in the last 14 years.

"He is a man of unusual ability," said his attorney. Four employees have offered him jobs, if he can go free.

The board considered his plea. Then it commuted his sentence. Sanders will be released on parole soon, probably next month.

Justice Burton to Leave Supreme Court Bench

Washington, Oct. 7 (AP)—Justice Harold H. Burton is retiring next Monday after 15 years on the Supreme Court, opening the way for the court's first Eisenhower-appointed majority.

The White House announced the 70-year-old justice's unexpected request for retirement last night, a week after the court opened its regular fall term.

The announcement gave no indication of whom President Eisenhower might name as a successor to Burton or how long he might serve.

A Republican, Justice Burton was retiring with the regular retirement age of 70.

Approving the request, Eisenhower praised Burton for "devoted and dedicated public service to our country" and "helped to shape the growth and development of our nation."

Justice Burton's appointment as a successor will be his fifth to the high court.
