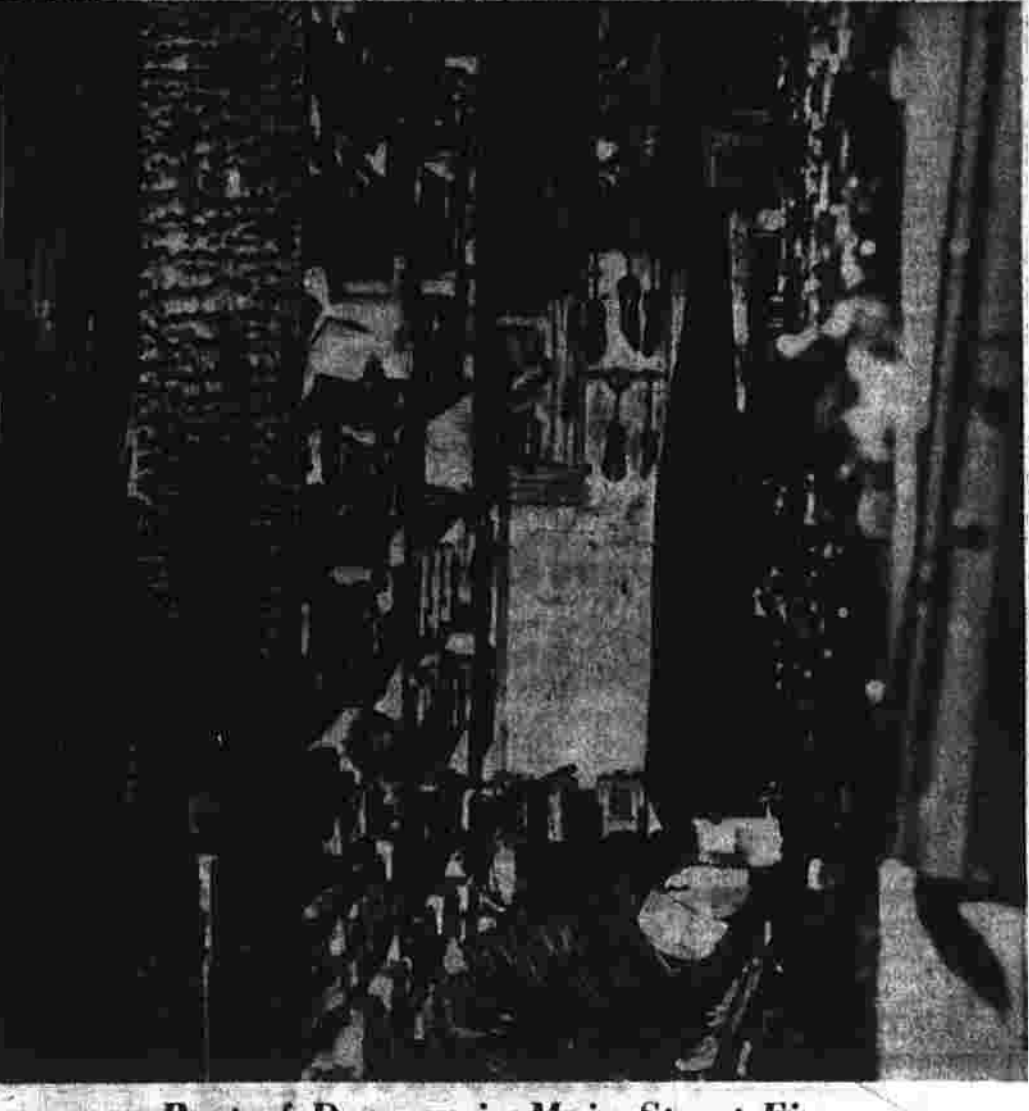

Sheinwold on Bridge

GET YOUR BELIEF FROM OPPONENTS

By Alfred Sheinwold

One of the exciting things about the new bridge is that you have the chance to pile up 50 points on a very short hand. This isn't as good as piling up 600 points, but it keeps your partner from falling asleep.

West opened the five of hearts, and East played the queen. South took the trick with his king. East returned a heart, and South won with the ace.

West's partner had his four top diamonds and the two top spades. South then played a low club to West's hand. West would be foolish enough to play low.

West sat up suddenly, like a man who had been surprised—as was actually the case. He took the king of clubs and three more heart tricks, defeating the contract.

"You're kidding, old boy?" West said to declarer. And that was probably the only kind word that could be said to declarer's method of playing the hand.

His subject, however, he should have led his last heart.

West would take three heart tricks, but then he would have to lead a spade or a club. A spade lead would give a trick to dummy's queen; and a club lead would give a free finesse. Either way, declarer would surely make his ninth trick.

West was wondering how South managed to pile up 50 points on this hand. He had led 130 honors, and this came out with a 50-point profit in spite of his careless play. The opponents were willing to give him 10 points whenever he had that good a hand!

Rockville-Vernon Legislature Candidates Speak Out on Issues

Vernon's four candidates for the State Legislature expressed varying opinions on local and state issues at a "Meet the Candidates" dinner at the Three's Restaurant in Bolton last night.

Questions were posed by Jay-Ann, sponsor of the dinner, the general public and the press. The candidates are: Vernon, Republican, James F. Vanderhoop; Democrat, Raymond Spelman; and Democrat, Harry Hamner.

The question raised by the candidates themselves dealt with their reasons for seeking a legislative seat.

Spelman said he was "attempting to do some good work in addition to making a living."

Vanderhoop expressed the conviction that serving the public in such a post would mean a basic human need, and added that he would "sincerely like to do a 'state job' if elected to the Legislature."

Hamner spoke of difficulties he has had getting bills for the City of Rockville through the state committee. He said he was "convinced about this and particularly about the office of the Town Clerk, and would like to see it established over water reserves other than the Public Utilities Commission."

Hamner, the only incumbent, remarked that "you're not changing the world there, and to get a bill through 'you've got to have the right men behind you." He also stated that he weighed each bill "and voted 'from the heart'."

Regarding Commerce:

"In reply to a question on party caucuses on bills, Vanderhoop said he would not necessarily follow the party vote if he felt differently about the bill."
