## Building Trades Seek Ways To Beat Anti-Closed Shop Rule

Washington, Oct. 16.—The construction industry is facing a major problem. It wants to continue hiring only union members despite a federal law which says that is illegal.

The ban against the closed shop in union contracts has been in effect for more than a decade, but the industry had been too disturbed about it until last year. Then the National Labor Relations Board announced a tough new policy of money penalties against employers and unions violating the law. Several times postponed, it has now become effective Nov. 1.

Some of the vast industry major employers and union leaders have a solution that will pass muster, yet continue the practice of hiring only union members, or substantially so, on the payroll.

Their solution: Junk the traditional, but illegal closed shop and substitute a sort of combined hiring, bid-distribution shop arrangement such as has been in effect in the machine industry and in some of the nation's factories.

The end result would be that the work force remains union. Under the closed shop only union men can be hired. Under the new policy of money penalties against employers and unions violating the law, several times postponed, it has now become effective Nov. 1. Some of the vast industry major employers and union leaders

policy is important because it affects over three million workmen as well as the labor supply arrangements for thousands of contractors, big and little.

"The bulk of the contractors on large-scale projects—such as railroads, bridges, office buildings and industrial plants—seem to prefer to deal with unions because they want an assured labor supply. There are no major exceptions made in Southern states. And, however building is only partly unionized, it is the exclusive source of manpower. It means the work goes to their members and the unions reap the huge profits.

When the union-dealing contractors have a big project to build, they want enough skilled workmen to finish the job on time without facing money penalties for delays beyond a scheduled completion date.

The non-union contractor can put ads in the papers but he's taking his chances on getting enough skilled workers, particularly on a remote site, and also the chance of a union boycott.

It's an open secret that despite the 1947 law against the closed shop, the bulk of the construction industry has gone right ahead hiring only union members.

Whenever a non-union worker is hired, it's usually on the spot. He may be working on a job that is being retained, or a job he would take years, and in the end the union and employer could merely be stuck for what wages the one employee might have lost.

"That prevailed until the NLRB handed down the Brown-Ohio decision involving an El Paso, Tex., contractor. It ruled that an employer and union, as parties to an illegal hiring arrangement, are jointly liable to return all dues, fees and assessments collected from all employees, for as long as thirty months. This could run into

hundreds of thousands of dollars on big jobs.

Charles D. Panton, NLRB general counsel, adopted a policy of giving time to employers and unions to get in line. He postponed the effect of the new penalty policy from last Jan. 1 to June 1, then to Sept. 1 and finally to Nov. 1. But he's said there will be no more delays.

Panton has said he looks at it as one of lowering a draw bridge instead of a hoist. In other words, he wants to lead the industry toward legality. He's been considering frequently with all sides.

Now for the "solution." Major employers and unions are lining up a hiring policy which would leave the union as the exclusive hiring source. It would provide all the workers. The union would agree to refer all closing, union and non-union, but according to prescribed federal plans.

# Daddario Says U.S. Can't Ignore Red China

Atty. Emilio Q. Daddario, Democratic candidate for Congress from the first district, said today the United States must face the fact that the Red Chinese regime is here to stay.

"The question of diplomatic recognition is complicated by domestic considerations, but the United States cannot for ever ignore the existence of 600,000,000 people on the mainland of China," he stated.

Daddario commented on the China matter in answer to questions at a breakfast meeting at Cava's Restaurant, some 30 persons, including several prominent Republicans and Democrats, in response to invitations from local Daddario supporters.

Daddario did not specifically recite the extension of United States recognition to Red China but he said that he has a "situation" which would "in the future permit commerce, trade and diplomatic relations with the government of the free world and Red China."

Chang Kai-shek is not going back to the mainland, he said. "The Red regime is not going to crumble from the inside," he declared.

"Must Look Ahead"

Daddario also said the United States must prepare now for the day when the Chinese Communists will take over the mainland and the future status of some 10,000,000 Formosans must be determined.

"The people on Formosa are not too happy with Chiang at the present time," he said, "and when Chiang passes to determine their future, the United States should prepare for that day now."

Commenting on the current crisis in the Formosa Strait, Daddario attributed the problem to the "unhappiness" policy of the Eisenhower administration.

He said support of Chiang is important from a strategic point of view, but it is equally important to us, for it is an area we need for our own protective purposes.

"But," he added, "Chiang himself has the power to move troops around and force our hand."

Chiang has the power to "force our hand," he said, "as Quomoz said."

He said the problem developed in 1953, when the Eisenhower administration ordered the evacuation of 100,000 troops from Formosa.

Emphasize Economic Aid

In response to other questions, Daddario called for the reallocation of mutual security funds to place more emphasis on economic aid and less on military assistance.

He said 65 per cent of the mutual security funds are being spent on military aid which does not help the economies of the countries receiving it and which does not help very much economically.

Greater emphasis on economic aid, he said, would not only help increase the standard of living of people around the world but would increase the number of markets available for United States production.

Expanding on this topic, he said that such aid is needed to oppose the indirect aggression of the Soviet Union and Communist China. These nations, he said, are using economic assistance programs of their own in a program aimed at shutting out existing markets in the free world.

Following the outbreak at Taiwan, the candidate toured the Longmeadow plant on Mill St. then went on a hand-shaking tour of Main St. He later addressed the Community luncheon meeting at the County Club.

### South Windsor School Board To Be Headed By Nicholson

Cornelius E. Nicholson, Pleasant Valley Rd., has been appointed chairman of the Board of Education for the South Windsor School District to replace John T. Kearney. A veteran member of the board, Nicholson has served previously as chairman and was chairman of the former School Building Committee here.

Nicholson's appointment became effective with the expiration of Kearney's one year term. Other officers appointed were: Dr. Irving Friedman, secretary; Merle B. Woodmansee, financial secretary.

Zone Changes Approved  
New regulations concerning subdivisions were passed at a Town Planning and Zoning Commission meeting held Tuesday evening at the Town Hall. Five additional requirements which subdividers must comply with were approved. Ensuring adequate play and recreational area for children is the purpose of the first regulation, according to David D. Smith, commission chairman. Developments of 50 or more homes located more than a half mile from a public playground or recreational area must have playground space set aside at the rate of one acre per 50 homes. Land so reserved shall be subject to commission approval as to suitability for play purposes.

A proportionate amount of land must be set in the case of smaller projects adjacent to property obviously subject to development which would raise the total number of new homes above the 50-occupant mark.

A second requirement is designed to prevent the sale or lease of land for subdivision before final commission approval has been granted. Preliminary approval does not create the right of the owner to sell, lease or offer for sale a plot to be subdivided.

A third regulation, Smith said, is intended to guarantee an adequate water supply for home owners. Individual wells may be located on lots without special approval to make sure that an ample supply of water will be provided. Community well systems are also subject to such approval.

A fourth stipulation provides that subdividers must post in cash with the town treasurer a sum equal to 1 1/2 per cent of estimated cost up to \$100,000. This money is used to insure the proper installation of streets, drains and other utilities. On estimates of over \$100,000 the amount which must be deposited must be \$1,000 plus one per cent of the amount over \$100,000.

The last requirement specifies that the minimum lot area provided by subdividers must be clear of encumbrances, rights of way or other circumstances that would prevent full use of the lot by the occupant.

On Oct. 28 the commission will meet with the town's planning consultant, Mr. Lincoln, to work on the zoning map.

The public asks what part the money managers play in: keeping the economy from slipping into depression, stifling a recovery, chipping away at the purchasing power of the dollar. People ask how "much" the money managers can do in: Starting a boom and keeping it going, encouraging investment that means more jobs, controlling inflation, making it easier for people to buy homes or automobiles, assuring citizens that their savings and pensions will be enough to provide for them in their old age.

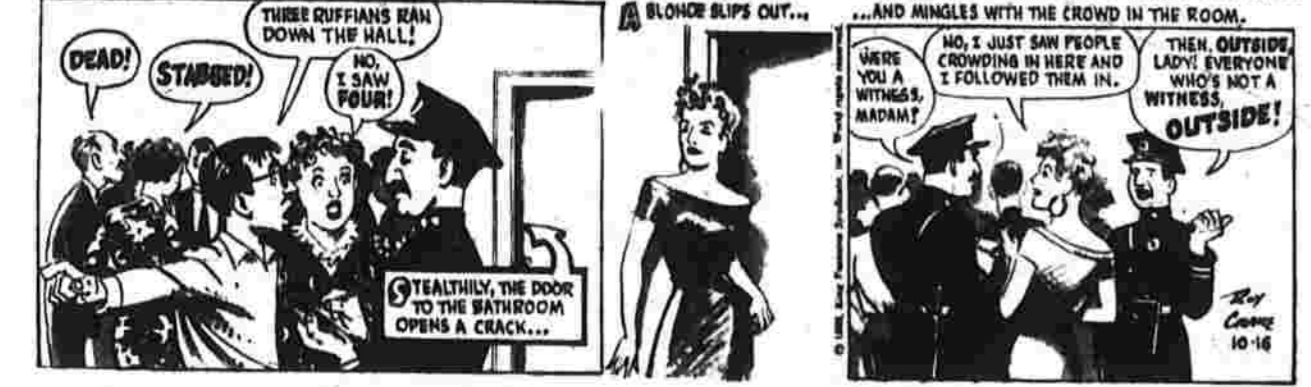
