Inflation Fear Voiced In Upturn of Business

Hot Springs, Va., Oct. 17 (AP)—The country's top industrial executives are warning that the business outlook has been replaced by high optimism and even some fear that the recovery may be too fast.

Most of the key industries reported a recovery in output in the second quarter. The Commerce Department's Business Advisory Council, made up of the heads of nearly 100 of the country's largest corporations, reported that the recovery is moving ahead more rapidly than expected.

Those interviewed expressed almost unanimous faith that the recovery is in sight, but they expressed fear that it will bring a revival of strong inflationary pressures.

Said one influential BAC member: "I hope we don't move directly into another big boom. The inflation already has gone wild."

GOP Views Conflict On Bridge Toll Issue

Manchester's Republican candidates for the State House and Senate have come up with conflicting views as to how the Connecticut River bridge toll issue should be resolved.

Paul Marie and Herman Yule, who are running for the House, have called for a "most equitable" toll arrangement through the issuance of uniform, non-transferable tickets from all five bridges. Atty. John R. Clifton, Republican candidate for the State Senate from the Fourth District, has proposed the elimination of tolls on all the bridges except the Charter Oak.

And both proposals differ from that of State Comptroller Fred Zeller, GOP opponent of the toll, who would remove tolls from one bridge but leave them on the other four.

Director Paul Martie criticized Thrall and General Manager Richard Martin for not having these figures at the hearing. The hearing was adjourned upon Martie's proposal that the figures be made available last Wednesday. Martie would ask that the project be expanded to include all side street sewerage.
