U.S. Facing Trouble Avoiding Upset in UN PF to Donate

By TOM HOGE United Nations, N.Y., Oct. 23 (P)

The United States has never suffered defeat on a major issue before the U.N., but it's a little harder each year to maintain that which the Communists enviously accuse the United States of wielding in the General Assembly may soon be just another figure of meech

soon be just another figure of speech.

New alignments and the entry of many neutrals into the U.N. make the Americans take careful stock of their position before risking prestige on any doubtful issue. Without the unswerving loyalty of the 20 Latin American Nations, the United States would have to yield ground to the Russians on many questions where world opinion is divided.

This weakened voting power was syldent in the ballot on the annual. American proposal to annual American proposal to shelve U.N. discussion of the Red China scating issue.

The United States finally won 44-28 with 9 abstentions. Without the 26 Latin American votes, it could have lost.

As it was, the United States managed to hold support of slight-ly more than 54 per cent of the 81 members. In 1954, when the Amer-icans first used the postponement maneuver to block Peiping, the U.S. proposal polled 71.6 per cent f the vote. In the intervening years the margin has narrowe The Bed China debate pointed up a "conspiracy of silence" that diplomats have noted on other east-west issues.

The Latin Americans voted solid-ly behind the United States, but none of the 20 usually voluble detegates spoke out for the American

gates spoke out for the American position.

The United State's ran into a warning sign when it supported the Philippines for a seat or the Security Council three years ago. After 38 ballots, the Assembly found itself hopelessly deadlocked. The outcome finally was decided with a throw of dice.

More and more nations, unwilling to take a stand on a sensitive question, take refuge in abstention. Thus the majority result on many ballots actually constitutes a minority of members present.


