Amazed rescue workers said that although some were injured all appeared in good condition considering the time they had been trapped without food or wa-ter. Some even appeared in bet-ter shape than 12 brought out Thursday after six days of hunger and thirst

Rescue areas said they were even met with a jest, when they finally dug through the debras to reach six of the men 13 000 feet from the mine entrance.




