Firm Policy Means Peace All 2,217 seats in the auditorium were filled and more persons gathered outside to hear the vice resident.

"In dealing with dictators first with Hitler and then with the Communiats - we have learned that a weak policy is a war policy. for resumption. a firm policy is a peace policy, Nixon said.

He said "those who think they can buy peace from the Communists by turning over territory to them simply do not know the fanatical, ruthless group of men who direct the master plan of the international Communist movement to conquer the world by force if necessary, by other means if possible,

'Making concession to them in territory will ant satisfy them, it will only whet their appetites and suggest to them that they might do it again and get away

Amazed rescue workers said that although some were injured all appeared in good condition considering the time they had been trapped without food or wa-ter. Some even appeared in bet-ter shape than 12 brought out Thursday after six days of hunger and thirst

Rescue mews said they were even met with a jest, when they finally dug through the debras to reach six of the men 13 000 feet from the mine entrance.

At the 9th International Astro-

nautical Federation Congress in Amsterdam I spoke to Dr. T. C. Helvey, of Radiations Inc. about those possibilities. Dr. Helvey presented, a significant paper in which he pleaded for more ground simulation tests of environments be encountered in space and disclosed results of studies made on how to protect the space traveler from the radiation belt and rom nuclear power plants which will power rockets of the future. He indicated that sensitivity of the body to radiations is still a highly controversial scientific sub-Scientists are aware that various parts of organs of the body have different degrees of sensitivity and the tolerance limits must be set to protect the most ensitive organs. This sensitivity and the unknown danger of anctic effects require a conservaive maximum permissable dose
