Amman, Nov. 11 (AP)-Jordan will refer the attack on King Hussein's plane over Syria on the U.N. Security Council, Premier Samir Rifai told an emergency session of the Parliament today.

"The government is of the opinion that it is its duty to take steps and me.sures it may deem necessary to uphold the state's prestige, to ensure its interests and to secure its vital routes of communications." he said. King Hussein raced home yes

terday with United Arab Republi jet fighters in pursuit shortly after taking off for a vacation i

While Parliament met, the king went to Amman airport to inspec two new jet fighters delivered by British pilois. They are the first of 12 Hawker Hunters to be de livered under the U.S. aid program. (The two planes flew from Cy

prus. Despite the uproar caused by the interception of the king's plane, the British on Cyprus said the two jets were being delivered to Jordan by way of Cairo, UAR capital.

In Damascus, a UAR Air Force spokesman charged Hussein violated Syrian air space by not getting clearance to fly over the county. He said the jets could easily have shot down the slow, unarmed royal plane.
