JORDAN, M.D. Written for NEA Service There are occasions when it is dvisable to give patients injec-ions directly into the blood stream through the veins (intravenous rather than by feeding drugs or other substances, or by muscular There are two principal reasons why this is done: Either because quick action is desired or because the substances, due to their nature, cannot be mouthfed or injected intramuscularly.

Some diseases can be treated best by intravenous injections. There are, for example, a number of chemical agents which are poorly absorbed or irritating if they are introduced into the body in any other way. In spite of this fact it is my impression that intravenue. other way. In spite of this fact it is my impression that intravenous treatment is not as often necessary today as it was in the past.

Injection directly into the veins has increased so far as the use of other substances is concerned.

Perhaps the most dramatic of these is the increased use of blood transfusion. Of course, those who have lost a great deal of blood may have their lives saved by receiving transfusions of blood obtained from other persons. Today blood transfusions are used more frequently during and following many operations and is one of the measures responsible for the increased safety of surgery.

In addition to blood, fluids and nutritious substances are given intravenously with some frequency. For example, for people who have lost a great deal of blood and for

lost a great deal of blood and for whom blood transfusion is not im-mediately possible, the fluid loss can be quickly made up by in-jecting water to which salts have been added. Dextrose solutions (sugar), as well as salts are often used in this manner. This obvious-ly is a quick source of providing ly is a quick source of providing

There have been some studies, particularly in recent years, on preparing and injecting food pro-teins directly into the blood stream through a vein. This has been help-ful for people who have had extremely poor nutrition for long periods of time and are unable to eat and digest food in the usual manner. It can also be used for some who are unable to eat adequate quantities because of interfering operations or diseases. At least one case is on rec at least one case is on record where a patient was kept
alive for eight weeks without any
food taken by mouth. Such a protein preparation was injected intravenously, together with sugar
and salt solutions to supply other
types of energy and fluid.

important place in medicine, it can
