Manchester—A City of Village Charm

Escaped Killer in Alabama

Birmingham, Ala., Nov. 28 (AP)—Escaped killer Spence Edwards was believed hiding out in the Birmingham area today after forcing three youths to drive him here from Tennessee.

The three teenagers told police they saw him flag a passing car as he left them Wednesday night. They were the latest of a series of kidnap victims as Edwards touched four states since escaping from a Dalton, Ga., labor camp.

Birmingham police said they believed that the car picked up Edwards by prearrangement. It was described as a 1953 or 1954 Ford. The color was dark brown over light brown or cream. Only the driver was noted in the car.

The boys said they saw him flag a passing motorist when he left their car, and that the brake lights of the car went on as Edwards, on foot, and the car rounded a corner out of sight.

"We told us to get going, gave us \$2 for gasoline and to get the car fixed and walked off," said Simon Warner Jr., 16, Shelbyville, Tenn.

The 35-year-old Edwards, fleeing a life sentence for killing a Georgia state policeman 11 years ago, had entered their lives just as suddenly Wednesday night.

Driving a Tennessee highway patrol car, he stopped Warner and two friends, David D. Thompson, 17, and Roger Carter Jr., 18. Warner said he forced them at gunpoint to drive him to Birmingham.

Edwards had commandeered the patrol car when Trooper Tom Moore, 28, after a routine check, noticed that Hubert Turner, a passenger in the car, with Edwards was heading out.

Britain Willing To Meet Reds On Reich Issue

By JOHN M. HIGHTOWER Washington, Nov. 28 (AP)—The United States and its allies began mapping strategy today for a long diplomatic battle against Russia's "free city" campaign to oust them from West Berlin.

The State Department gave notice last night that the U.S. government does not intend to enter into any agreement with the Soviet Union which would result in abandoning the people of West Berlin to hostile domination.

Some western counter proposals calling for a solution of the Berlin problem as part of an all-German settlement may be put forth in the same time.

Institutions were that the negotiations will reach a climax at a meeting of foreign ministers of the 15 North Atlantic Allies in Paris Dec. 15.

Inauguration Day Ceremonies Set For Gov. Ribicoff

Hartford, Nov. 28 (AP)—Gov. Abraham Ribicoff will start his second year in Jan. 7 with the traditional pomp and circumstance of inauguration day.
Inauguration Day will be held with red carpeted guests on foot and horse back, a top hat reception, a parade, a 19-gun artillery salute, and a solemn oath-taking ceremony. And shortly after sunset, the inaugural ball, one of the top social events of the year, will be held in the State Armory.
The opening of the day's schedule calls for a formal session for the Governor and both the retiring and incoming State officers. A parade in the State Capitol will follow, where the Governor will be greeted by the 16-gun salute.
Gov. Ribicoff will take his oath of office before a joint session of the State Senate and State House of Representatives. The Chief Justice of the State Supreme Court of Errors will administer the oath.
Other State officers will also be sworn into office. Gov. Ribicoff will then deliver his inaugural address, outlining the fundamental policies of his second administration.
The public will be invited to a reception following Ribicoff's address.

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Old Tradition Provides New Christmas Joys

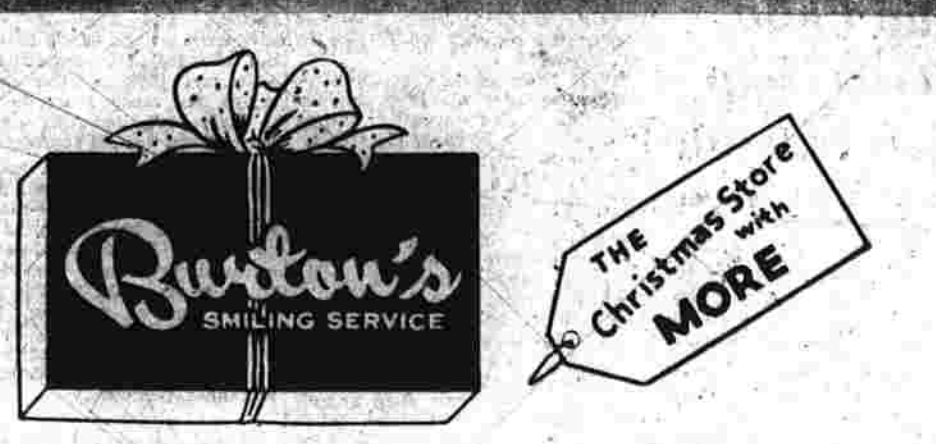

After supper every evening from the time you get up the crib until Christmas Eve the whole family gathers around the crib and each member of the family is allowed to put in as many straws as his day of good deeds permits. Tell the children of the story of Mary and Joseph, of how they were turned away from the inn and finally found quarters in the stable. The children will be eager to make the Christ Child's bed just as soft and comfortable as possible. Christmas Eve when you take it to Him.

As you put the straw into the crib each evening, talk to the children about the kind person who made the Christ Child's bed just what would truly please Him and



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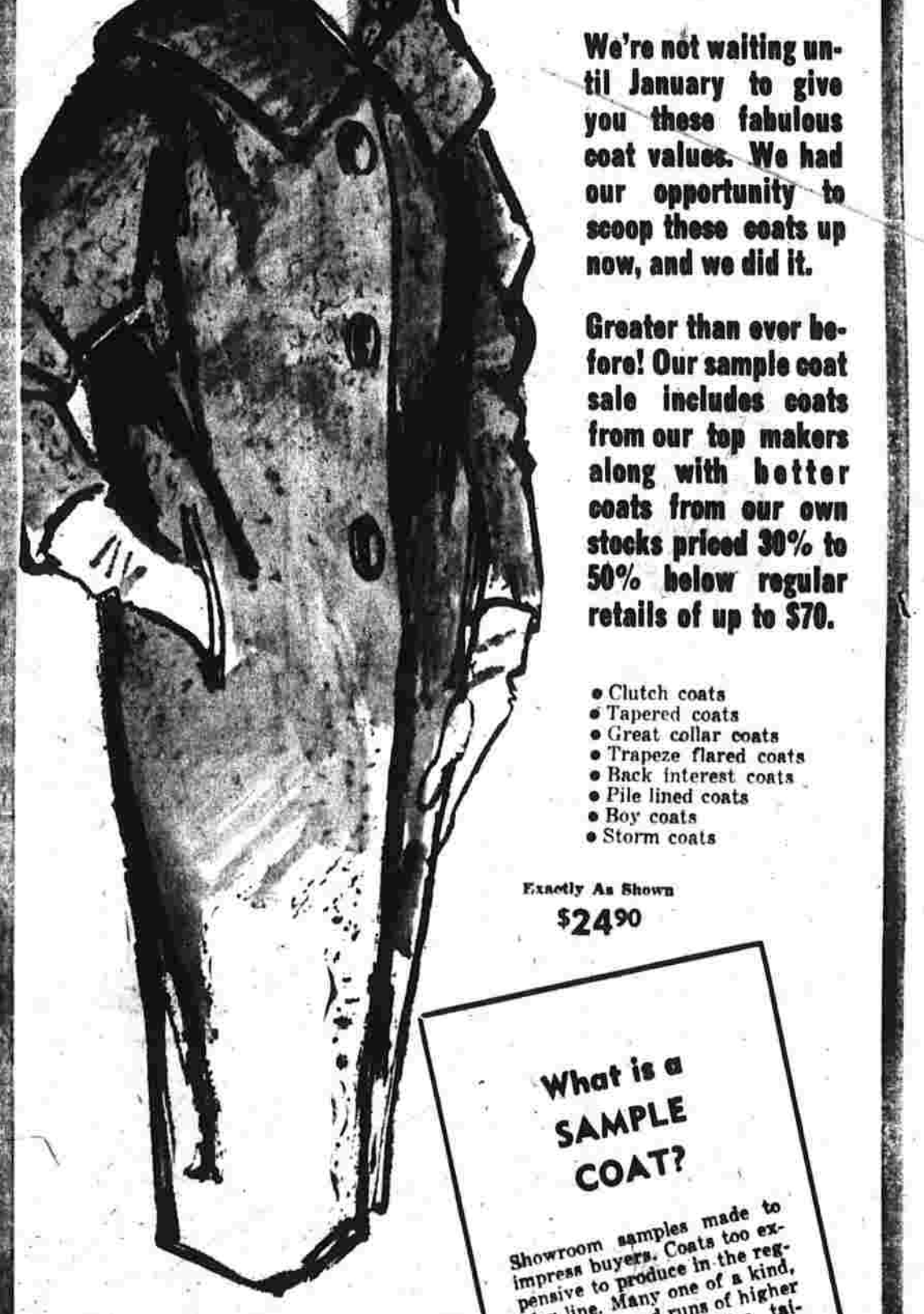

Housewife's System Pays Off, Her First Novel Hits Jackpot

Norwich (6)—If you wait until inspiration strikes, you never get a book written," says Mildred Savage. "You go about writing systematically."

Even with a systematic approach, it took five years of daily work to produce Mrs. Savage's first novel, "The System," which was published by the publisher who looked at the manuscript and bought it for \$10,000. Mrs. Savage will profit by a sum close to \$20,000 for her effort, which was after three years she had made a profitable occupation.

Wife of a Connecticut businessman, Mrs. Savage, is the mother of two children, a housewife by primary occupation and a writer in hours when her family does not have first call on her services. This makes her writing day start at 9 a.m., which is fine because she is at her best early in the day and she has one day a week which also takes off from family chores.

"The book started with one single idea," explained the author. "That every person has some person or thing that he likes to do, and that grows up to mature—I feel one must be a few small things."

Lots of Research

With her theme set, she then looked for a background in which to set her characters. She found it close to home. "The system" is set in the Connecticut Valley which produces the high grade tobacco wrappers—outside coverings for the best cigars.

"Then I had to do lots of research," said Mrs. Savage. "One day a week I read the newspaper, talking to the planters, in the workers, walking through the sheds. I visited libraries and universities and read up on tobacco and tobacco growing. At this point I knew just about everything about cigars except how they taste. I've yet to smoke one."

Meanwhile, as a preliminary to writing, she was getting to know her characters.

"I made notes about every one of them," she continued. "I had to know each one intimately."

What is your teenager like? Do you by any chance have a shy, fearful withdrawn youngster who feels unhappy that he or she is not popular with the gang? There are lots of half-grown youngsters who eat out their hearts because they feel they are not liked by their age-mates. Such young people stay at home pretending to be more interested in reading or TV or some hobby than playing around with other youngsters. A lonely adolescent often does his best to put up a good front. He gives a lot of lip service to the ally nature of the classmates' leisure time occupations. He's just not interested, or he says, "Maybe this is true, but more often than not it is the deeply hurt by the fact that he is not included on parties, and even on these few occasions when he does go along, he feels out of the swing. Things have changed considerably since that far day, 10 years ago, when a TV set was a novelty and a guy went broke buying food out from the neighbors who thrived to watch it.

Man's Most Debated School
 The amount of community struggle that goes into the building of any important school is perhaps a constant amount. If we have to smooth a time of it getting up to the point of a public vote, that is the time to watch for opposition to the polls. The taxpayers have a grim habit of trying to make sure that they are voting for a necessary and getting their money's worth, and not spending too much money, either.

We have gone all the new junior high school the other way round. It has had in the planning stages, the roughest time of all our post-war propositions. There has been controversy and division of opinion over site, over style of building, over the amount of space required, over everything, in fact, except one thing. There has been no controversy over the need for the building.

All this controversy, however annoying and unpleasant it may have been for some of those who wish to run the project along, or for those who found some point of view of their own over-riding in the continuing process of compromise, adjustment and modification of what our needs really are and what the building really should be, has been resulting in a more assured assurance that every kind of question he himself might care to raise has already been raised, and either answered, or headed, if its point was valid. He has, for once, an advance assurance that the exponents of necessity, and the exponents of economy and common sense, have met on the field of battle and reached a proper adjustment and satisfaction of both aims.

And the proof of all this, if the taxpayer hadn't been watching it, happens in the fact that final link in all that great post-war school expansion which has done much credit to Manchester. This will make the system complete, as our school authorities and our parents want it, and as we have to have it. If we are going to treat all our children fairly and alike in the years ahead.

All of us know this, even those of us who scratch around for last-minute arguments for some change, or some delay.

Dutifully, in a speech which had been prepared for her, Mrs. Anderson read the official policy of the United States, and actually made the motion to adjourn the discussion. But, as the debate went on, and a number of nations expressed themselves on both sides of the issue, Miss Anderson took the floor again this time extemporaneously. Her motion had been while she was speaking, and she herself attacked for making it.

"There is no one in this room," she said, "who is more interested in the people whose fate we are trying to determine than I. Like many of the representatives, I am a member of an interested delegation, and we are here to carry out what is wanted, otherwise we would not be here."

"That was her alight and temporary decision of personal view, her momentary departure from her role as a window-dressing for her country's official policy. Then our officials said this was a mistake, and issued a new text in which her extemporaneous remarks were simply omitted and ignored.

Nixon Guessed Wrong On How to Win Votes

Washington, Nov. 28 (AP)—Vice President Nixon led an egg-on-their-face parade in the White House today when he conducted a score campaign against the Democrats in the 20 November elections, and urged all the Republican candidates to do the same. It didn't work. The Republican suffered disaster. This week's vote was the first since Nixon took office in January 1953. He had predicted that the Republican would win in 1958. But the election results showed that he was wrong in his guess on how to win.

Congressman-elect Emilio Q. Daddario heard his future described as bright and well-wishers at a testimonial dinner Wednesday night as being filled with bright promises and bright hopes.

There are six occasions when it is advised to give intravenous injections directly into the blood stream through the veins (intravenous) rather than by feeding drugs or other substances, or by muscular injections.

There have been some studies, particularly in recent years, on preparing and injecting food products directly into the blood stream through a vein. This has been helpful for people who are unable to eat for periods of time and are unable to eat and digest food in the usual manner. It can also be used for some people who are unable to eat adequate quantities because of interfering operations or diseases.
