# Top Talk Evidence Of Early Moonshot

The elaborate guidance system and reversing rocket in the Air Force shot, added greatly to the final stage weight—but the Army rocket gets along with a minimum of guidance brains and no reversing rocket. It undoubtedly carries some instruments for measuring the phenomena of space, but the Army has not announced any details.

The 50-pound Army shot is less ambitious. It too is aimed at the moon's surface. But if it works well it may be destined for a greater glory.

The Army has packed its rocket with enough power and speed to overcome the pull of the earth's gravity and escape into the gravity domain of the sun.

Von Braun, chief architect of the Army shot, says it has a 1 in 2 chance of building up escape velocity and so blasting away from the earth into a possible orbit around the sun.

Such an orbit might last some millions of years perhaps even billions.

This assumes first that all of the moon's heat energies will be used and that it will overheat, the moon.

The moon is not an easy target to hit. So many things are unknown about its mass and behavior that it can easily be missed.

Just as unpredictable is the behavior of the moon's rocket itself.

The Air Force rocket that burned about 80,000 miles above the earth made a great penetration of space might have gone to the moon. But with each stage of its flight, it fell a little more away from its programmed path.

Finally it was at such an angle that its energy was not most effectively used and it was lost out before it had gone over than a third of the way.

German measles important cause of defects at birth to thousands of parents and to the youngsters involved.

Among the more common of these congenital malformations are harelip and cleft palate, club foot, and what is called congenital heart disease. There are a number of others such as web fingers but perhaps those mentioned are the most frequent.

There are some truly hereditary diseases, but congenital defects are almost certainly not inherited. So a young adult contemplating marriage need not fear any great risk of passing these defects on.

A good deal of work has been done in recent years on the congenital malformations of the eye and on those of the ear, nose and throat. It is now possible to detect many of these malformations in the fetus in the womb. This is done by means of a special test known as the amniotic fluid test. This test is done during the first three months of pregnancy.

Analysis of evidence on this score suggests that the potential risk of giving birth to a congenitally malformed child is increased approximately 100 times if the mother has had German measles during the critical period. But another way the frequency of congenital malformations in the children of such mothers is about 12 out of 100.

So far as German measles is concerned, one writer recommends that young girls should be deliberately exposed, since an attack generally provides lifelong immunity. He also recommends that women pregnant during the first three months who are exposed to German measles should be given immediately large doses of gamma globulin.
