

Rides 600 Miles Up; Nose Cone Vanishes

Washington, Dec. 13 (P)-The Army flung a tiny monkey into space today but lost it in the South Atlantic. -Six hours after the monkey began its journey in the nose cone of a Jupier intermediate range ballistic missile the Army announced that the search for the little space traveler had been abandoned. It was the first attempt by the United States to put a
