

# High Level East, West Talks Seen

Berlin, Dec. 16 (/P)-West Berlin's Mayor Willy Brandt flew back today from the Paris Foreign Ministers conference and warned the Communists: "Berlin is no soft spot." The mayor said in an airport statement his isolated

city is "a long way from the end of the crisis," but would hold out against Communist pressure. "We can trust the guarantee of the western powers," he

Paris, Dec. 16 (P)-The oreign ministers of the Atantic Pact countries today flatly rejected Russian pressures on Berlin but held out the possibility of high-level talks with the Soviet Union on East-West problems

The western leaders agreed how-, that such talks could not be successful under the threats of any ultimatum on West Berlin. U.S. Secretary of State Dulles told his colleagues in the North Atlantic council that Soviet Premier Khrushchev will not risk war over Berlin.

"Therefore we can proceed with confidence." Dulles asserted He added: "We must not give an appearance of success to a bold and ckless move. In this respect he (Khrushchey) is like Hitler -if
