IN THE ASSOCIATED PRESS Religious services in Christian communities throughout the world today quietly commemorated the eve of the day almost 2,000 years ago when the Prince of Peace was horn in Bethlehem.

Thousands of pilgrims gathere in Bethlehem to offer prayers for peace in a world which lives in the shadow of war Many million more made the short pilgrimage to their community centers of worship for Christmas Eve serv

The theme of "Peace on earth good will to men" was repeated in housands of churches. President Eisenhower said the theme of the Christmas Story con tained an ideal of all men, regard-less of their beliefs. The United States will work toward that ideal, the President said in Washington just before lighting the national Christmas tree in the park behind the White House. For many in the United States it was a day of irritation beyond

usually caused by the lastminute rush to the stores. New Yorkers were still without their newspapers as a 2-week-ole strike of deliverymen continued.
