

New Flag, 49th State Due Jan. 3

Washington, Dec. 31 (/P)-The nation gets a new state and a new flag Saturday. President Elsenhower will sign the proclamation making Alaska the 49th state at a formal cere-mony in the White House Satur-day at noon. He will fly to Wash-ington for the number and return ington for the purpose and return later to his Gettysburg, Pa., farm for the remainder of the weekend.

The new state enters the union immediately. The new flag will become official next July 4, but flag makers in New York said yes-terday they would have a few of the 49-star flags available as early as next week as next week. The flag design will not be an-nounced until Saturday. There was speculation it would consist of the present 13 stripes, with seven rows of seven stars.each in the

Some flag makers have sought a staggered design, with five rows of five stars and four with six stars. Then if Hawaii gets state-hood later, they contended, an-other star could be added easily by having five rows of six stars each and four with five stars. But they held little hope of success for their suggestion. The still unannounced design
