Traffic deaths across the country for the 4-day New Year's holiday were occurring today at a rate which could exceed the record for a similar New Year's weekend.

More than 40 hours after the start of the 102-hour holiday period the death rate from highway accidents was slightly more than four an hour. If the pace continues throughout the period, the record of 409 deaths set in the 4-day New Year's weekend of 1956-57 would be topped.

The National Safety Council has estimated the New Year's traffic toll this year will reach 390.

The council said the shock of the 594 deaths recorded during the 4-day Christmas holiday a week ago apparently was not having much effect on drivers this weekend.

Traffic deaths last year, estimated at 37,000 by the council, averaged about 101 a day. But the slaughter on the highways

since the start of the New Year holiday about 6 p.m. (local time) Wednesday topped the daily traffic toll in 1958. The count continues until midnight Sunday.

"The weather is bad and the toll is bad," the council said. "The toll is proceeding at an alarming rate. We appeal to every driver to realize that he must hold his speed down and be doubly careful."

Show, sleet and rain in many sections of the country added to the normal heavy holiday travel yesterday and deaths took a sharp upturn after a comparatively safe start. Treacherous driving conditions were reported in many areas, especially in the Midwest and East. Local blizzard conditions added to the traffic hazards in the High Plains and Upper Mississippi Valley.

The council urged motorists in the storm areas to drive with extra caution and "hold speed down to emergency conditions."

A council spokesman said if the rate of deaths reported yesterday continued, traffic fatalities for the holiday period will exceed 400.

In the one-day New Year's celebration last year, 160 persons lost their lives in traffic accidents. That was the highest total on record for a one-day observance of the New Year holiday.

In comparison with last week's Christmas holiday period, the traffic toll was much lower. Safety experts say the New Year toll always has been lower than in the Christmas period, mainly because there is less long-distance travel. The final toll in the long Christmas weekend was 594 traffic deaths, 93 killed in fires and 97

Urrutia Proclaimed Provisional Leader

Washington, Jan. 2 (AP)—A provisional Cuban government headed by Dr. Manuel Urrutia, will be established today in Havana, a top Cuban source said today.

The statement came from Nicolas Rivero, a Fidel Castro supporter who resigned his embassy post here about 18 months ago. He now is a spokesman for the Cuban embassy here under the direction of a charge d'affaires picked by the Castro group.

Havana, Jan. 2 (AP)—Fidel Castro triumphantly proclaimed Judge Manuel Urrutia temporary president of Cuba today and sent the vanguard of his bearded guerrilla fighters rolling into Havana.

All Cuba appeared within the grasp of the 32-year-old rebel leader whose relentless pressure sent President Fulgencio Batista and his civilian and military chiefs fleeing into exile yesterday.

Even before the first truckloads of rebel guerrillas sped into the city, the men of Castro were in undisputed control of the bedraggled capital, still tense after a day of rioting.

The army and the police were taking orders from Castro's leaders already installed at Camp Columbia in a Havana suburb.

Young partisans roamed the streets, firing wildly, herding off suspected enemies to jail at gunpoint, and smashing into buildings looking for weapons or Batista supporters.

Newsmen Seized, Released
Three Associated Press men were taken from their office in the Post building at gunpoint, marched to a police station, questioned, and then released. They were Larry Allen, roving AP correspondent, George Kaufman, Havana AP Bureau chief, and Harold Valentine, AP photographer.

Truckloads of bearded guerrilla fighters rolled into the city over the main central highway from the eastern provinces of Matanzas and Las Villas and sped along the Malecon Sea Boulevard toward the former military headquarters of deposed President Batista at Camp Columbia.

As the Castro forces advanced, Cuba's 6,300,000 war-weary people had two provisional presidents. Neither occupied the chair vacated by Batista. The other, Manuel Urrutia, fled in the darkness of the New Year morning yesterday.

The streets of Havana were tense and alive with expectation. The triumphant Castro partisans, who had seemed to emerge armed from nowhere yesterday to take over control of the capital, kept a tight lid on the situation to prevent next-day public emotion from creating a chaotic situation.

In this capital sits the last vestige of a shell of government named by the junta which Batista had installed at the start of the country's early New Year's Day. But the government had no control over either the army or the police who now get their orders from rebel leaders installed at Camp Columbia in a Havana suburb.

The Castro troops entering Havana were unopposed. They were led by the Argentine physician, Ernesto Guevara, and Camilo Cienfuegos, two of the rebel chief's hard-fighting field commanders.

A final showdown obviously is near, Castro announced today. He would not accept what he called a coup d'etat arranged by Batista. Thus he rejects the provisional government which purports to be headed by Supreme Court Justice Carlos Piedra.

Castro claimed Maj. Gen. Eulogio Cantillo, who headed the junta left by Batista, had betrayed the revolution's leadership by letting the chief figures of the Batista government escape from the country.

While Castro's success in his 25-month-old rebellion seemed close

Cuban Consul Hints Trial of War Criminals

Chicago, Jan. 2 (AP)—Cuban consular records throughout the world were ordered seized today by the Castro government.

The move was announced by Constantine N. Kangles, Cuban consul here, appointed his general consul for the United States.

Kangles issued a statement saying the seizure of consular records and documents was planned months ago to safeguard them for possible use by the new government "as evidence in the trials of war criminals."

Serapio Montejó of Chicago, president of the Cuban Liberation Movement of July 26, was appointed acting consul general in Chicago.

The text of Kangles' statement is: "The seizure of the Cuban consulates throughout the world was a planned movement which was decided upon many months ago by the leaders of the 26th of July Movement to prevent the destruction or loss of important documents which may be of use to the new government."

Britain's Gold, Dollar Stocks In Sharp Drop

London, Jan. 2 (AP)—Britain's gold and dollar reserves fell in December for the first time in 15 months, due to large-scale loan repayments to the United States and Canada.

A Treasury announcement said the reserves had dipped by \$145 million and stood at 1,066 million pounds (\$2,069,000,000) at the end of the year.

The strengthening of reserves was reported to have been a factor in Britain's decision last week to make the pound partially convertible. This move enabled foreign holders of sterling to convert their money directly to dollars. It could lead to pressure on the national reserves.

There was no indication that the slump in reserves is linked with the convertibility decision. There has been no discernible rush to unload sterling and the freeing of the pound came too late in the month to have much effect on the December figures.

The Treasury said the equivalent of 70 million pounds (\$136 million) was paid on various North American loans—including the Canadian interest-free loan during the month. A further sum of million pounds (\$1,200,000,000) went as the November settlement to

Platform Set in 1955

Castro for Taking American Utilities

Havana, Jan. 2 (AP)—Rebel leader Fidel Castro's last announced platform calls for the nationalization of American utilities and sugar estates in Cuba.

The bearded guerrilla chieflet published his program in 1955, while in exile in Mexico.

1. Nationalization of U.S. financed and operated utilities in Cuba and division of American-owned sugar estates among Cuban peasants.

2. Confiscation of all properties acquired through "corrupt government."

3. Distribution of 50 percent of all industrial and utility enterprises to Cuban workers.

4. A public housing and rural electrification program.

5. Liberation of Cuba "from the economic interests of half a dozen businessmen."

6. A speed up of industrialization and increased social security.

Castro never doubted that he would win the victory over strongman Fulgencio Batista.

Now 32, the lanky, 6-foot-2-inch leader is a professional rebel who has been in revolt most of his life. He has been involved in revolutionary movements in the Dominican Republic, where Batista took refuge and in Colombia.

In 1947 he joined an expedition to the Dominican Republic aimed at overthrowing the dictatorship of Rafael Trujillo.

The expedition was a failure and Castro escaped by sea.

In 1948, Castro appeared in Colombia before the Ninth International Conference of American States protesting what he termed the non-Latin influence in Latin America. He joined with a group of Colombian rebels and was captured. He gained his freedom, reportedly largely through the influence of the U.S. delegate to the conference, Gen. George C. Marshall.

On July 26, 1953, he led a bloody but unsuccessful attack on an army barracks in Santiago de Cuba, capital of Oriente Province at the eastern end of Cuba.

Planes, Boats Bring Batista Friends to U.S.

The Cuban revolution has sent hundreds of supporters of Cuban dictator Fulgencio Batista scurrying for cover in the United States and the Dominican Republic.

Planes, including the fallen president's private craft, a yacht, an auto ferry and even a converted PT boat, carried the "refugees" from the war-torn Caribbean island. Batista, himself, fled to exile in the Dominican Republic, leaving Cuba to the rebel forces of Fidel Castro.

A Cubana Airlines plane brought 92 persons from Havana to New York's Idlewild Airport. The pilot said he took off at gun-point.

"I wasn't a good friend of Batista, and I didn't want to help Batista's men out of the country," the pilot, Capt. Miguel Raul Cabeza, said.

Police forced a boat of angry, shouting Castro sympathizers to get at the Cuban crew members of the airplane.

Two guns were found behind seats after the plane landed at Idlewild. Police made no arrest because it could not be determined to whom the weapons belonged.

Refugee-laden planes from Havana also landed at New Orleans, Miami, Jacksonville, Key West, Daytona Beach, and West Palm Beach, Fla.

At Linden, N. J., scores of Cuban sympathizers to Castro, converged on the airport after a radio report that the ousted chief of the Cuban security police would land.

The plane they awaited did not appear.

The Cubans said they had heard a report from the rebel radio that Gen. Orlando Piedra, dubbed "The Butcher" for his activities as chief, was flying to Linden with other Batista henchmen.

Rayburn Acts To Bar Revolt On Rules Unit

Washington, Jan. 2 (AP)—A series of hurdles centering around House Speaker Sam Rayburn (D-Tex.) was expected today to stamp out a budding revolt against the power of the House Rules Committee.

The revolt is led by a sizable group of self-styled Liberals. The Rules Committee now is "dominated by a coalition of Republicans and southern Democrats."

The Liberals seek to limit the committee's power to bottle up legislation. They would do this either by a change in House rules or by the addition of a Liberal Democrat to the committee, now composed of eight Democrats and four Republicans.

Rayburn returned late yesterday from his Texas ranch, where he has been vacationing since Congress adjourned last summer.

He wouldn't comment on the rules proposals, but there were clear signs he would oppose them. He apparently was quietly sizing up the situation and lining up his forces for a showdown at the Democratic caucus next Tuesday morning.

Fit Words to Berlin

Gettysburg, Pa., Jan. 2 (AP)—President Eisenhower has told Pussian leaders their professed desire for peace should be applied to their handling of the Berlin crisis.

He made a pointed reply in an exchange of New Year's greetings with Soviet Premier Nikita Khrushchev and President Kliment E. Voroshilov.

Their message, delivered to Eisenhower's farm home near here, expressed hope that 1959 would see an end to "years of the dangers of a new world war."

Eisenhower—watching a football game on television, as it happened, when the message came in—shared the Russians' hopes. He agreed that "genuine efforts" might well be fruitful, and went on to say:

"At this moment it seems to me critically important to apply the sentiments expressed in your message to the Berlin situation. In this connection, I cannot fail to recall your government's declaration toward the people of Berlin."

He referred to the Russians' announced intention to make Berlin a free city—which would mean western withdrawal from a key city that, in this country's view, would then inevitably come under Communist rule.

Eisenhower said the Russians' move to take over Berlin is not in accord with your expressed aspirations, and hopes for peaceful coexistence.

Then Eisenhower reiterated the stand taken by the United States,

Ike Prods Russians Show Peace Desire

Britain and France in formal notes delivered only Wednesday to the Kremlin. Those notes, rejecting Russia's demand that they agree within six months to leave Berlin, suggested a general conference on German problems.

"The United States government," Eisenhower said, "regrets that, in an atmosphere devoid of any kind of coercion and threat, it would welcome discussion on the question of Berlin in the wider framework of the whole German problem and European security. Positive progress in this specific problem would, I deeply believe, give real substance to the hope that 1959 would witness great advances toward the goal of a just and lasting peace."

The Russians' note was much like one they sent last year—in commercial cable and telegraph directly to the President rather than through diplomatic channels. This one came the same way.

Khrushchev and Voroshilov told Eisenhower:

"We would like to express the hope that in the coming year our countries will unite their efforts in the search for a way toward the settlement of international problems, for the cessation of the Cold War which is hated by the people, with the aim of reducing international tensions.

"The development of friendly co-operation on the basis of principles of peaceful coexistence between states would permit the deliverance of mankind from feelings of alarm for the future from fears of the dangers of a new war."

Eastern to Resume North-South Trips

Some 16,000 Eastern employees prepared to go back to their jobs as the line signed a New Year's Eve peace pact with its engineers.

Rebel Backer Denies Castro To Nationalize

Washington, Jan. 2 (AP)—A leader of Cuban rebel sympathizers said today the change of government in his country would not bring nationalization of sugar plantations or utilities owned by outside interests.

Ernesto Betancourt made the statement during an interview on the NBC-TV "Today" program when asked about a 1955 statement by rebel chief Fidel Castro in this country, Castro was said to have favored nationalization.

"That has been discarded as an impractical and unwise move," replied Betancourt. "Castro himself is the owner of a sugar plantation and I doubt he will be in the mood to nationalize anything."

Betancourt also said that Castro would not seek the Cuban presidency.

"Castro cannot be a candidate. He's too young to be a candidate," said Betancourt. Castro is 31. The constitution requires the president to be 35.

Betancourt was asked about statements that there were Communists among the rebels. He said such statements were made by followers of former President Fulgencio Batista to try to discredit the rebels.

"We are against the Communists," Betancourt said. "We don't want to have anything to do with them."
