U.S. STEEL TO RUSSIA New York, Jan. 8 (AP)-A New York export broker confirmed today that he is shipping 20,000 today that he is snipping 20,000 ions of American automotive steel to Russia in exchange for 80,000 tons of soviet chromium ore. Ara Oztemel, president of Greg-Gary Corp., said he ob tained the wide, cold-rolle sheet'steel from Republic Stee Corp. of Cleveland, He said this is the first major shipment a American steel to the Soviet Union in several years.
