Judge Gryk Resigns Bench After Local Man 'Bombs' Home

Judge Wesley C. Gryk resigned his town court position this morning following the arson attempt against his home early yesterday morning.

This surprise development followed the disclosure that the man arrested for the incident had allegedly been attempting to blackmail Gryk for the past two months.

However, none of the officials connected with the case would discuss further details other than to say that Joseph Kaminsky Jr., 27, of 413 N. School St., was picked up in connection with the case yesterday threatened to accuse Gryk "of crimes."

Gryk judge since July 1955, assumed court officials and others with his announcement, in which he said he was acting out of sympathy for the feelings of his family. The resignation is effective today.

Local police say Kaminsky, a Pratt & Whitney Aircraft electrician, tossed a burning flare type bomb through a window of the Gryk home at 423 E. Center St., at about 12:30 a.m. Sunday. Gryk, his wife and their 11-year-old son, Wesley Jr., fled the house but were uninjured. The flare did little damage.

Held in \$20,000 Bond

Kaminsky, arrested by State Police on a bench warrant, has been charged with arson and blackmail and is being held under \$20,000 bond. He was to be arraigned in Hartford County Superior Court this afternoon.

Gryk made his announcement this morning just before a court recess at 9:35. He said he would submit his resignation, effective today.

NASA Orders Space Capsule For Passenger

Washington, Jan. 12 (AP)—McDonnell Aircraft Corp. of St. Louis was selected today to design and build a space capsule to carry the passenger in the nation's first manned satellite.

The National Aeronautics and Space Administration said negotiation for a formal contract with McDonnell will begin immediately.

Twelve firms submitted bids to NASA on the basis of specifications set forth at a meeting with its manufacturing and research organizations last November.

NASA said a single satellite capsule with its connected equipment is expected to cost over \$15 million.

NASA said the space capsule, to be shot into space by a powerful booster, will be designed to carry a human passenger through the atmosphere into orbit, flight and return him safely to Earth.

"The satellite system will provide a means of studying the psychological and physiological effects of space flight on men," NASA's announcement said.

"The research will include man's reaction to weightlessness during orbital flight, high acceleration and other factors."

McDonnell previously alerted it was learned that Gryk had informed State and local police some time ago of Kaminsky's alleged threats against him. State's Atty. Albert S. Hill said Gryk had made a formal complaint with the State Police, and that the matter had been under investigation.

As a result, Patrolman Kenneth Barker was able to pick up Kaminsky.

Stolen Baby Found Alive, Unhurt; Mother of 8 Held

Judge Defies U.S. Order on Voter Records

Clayton, Ala., Jan. 12 (AP)—A defiant Alabama judge turned Barbour County's voter registration records over to a county grand jury today in the face of a federal court order to let federal agents see them.

Clayton Judge George C. Wallace left it up to the grand jury to determine whether agents of the Civil Rights Commission will inspect the records in connection with the commission's investigation of Negro voting complaints.

Wallace expected to call another grand jury into session in Bullock County Tuesday to turn custody of that county's records over to the jurors.

It is under federal court order to make the registration files available to commission investigators between 10 a.m. and 4 p.m. today and Tuesday in both counties.

Wallace told the grand jury here that he is willing to face the consequences if his action brings a violation for contempt of federal court.

Civil Rights agents who had come here to look at the records were in the courtroom when the Alabama judge gave the grand jury custody of the registration files. They refused to discuss the matter with newsmen.

Wallace explained to the jurors that he had impounded the records weeks ago on complaints of irregularities in registration and wanted to clear it up before he leaves office next Monday.

His brother, Jack Wallace of Clayton, will succeed him as judge.

George Wallace ran for governor in the Democratic primaries last spring and didn't seek reelection to the bench. He was runner-up to Gov. John Patterson.

In Montgomery, U.S. Dist. Judge Frank M. Johnson Jr. who issued the order for the 39-year-old Clayton judge to produce the records, declined to comment on the lawsuit developed by the clash between state and federal authority.

Wallace made it clear to the grand jury that he was leaving the issue up to the 18 members.

Footprints Prove Girl Chionchio's

New York, Jan. 12 (AP)—A mother of eight children was booked today on a kidnap charge, a few hours after 10-day-old Lisa Chionchio was found unharmed and well in a Brooklyn apartment.

The woman identified as Mrs. Jean Iavarone, 43, was booked at Brooklyn 82d Precinct Police Station on Butler St., after stubbornly claiming her innocence throughout the night.

"There is no doubt on the basis of scientific evidence, that she took the child," said Chief Asst. Dist. Atty. J. Kenneth McCabe.

He said the infant, snatched from St. Peter's Hospital nursery shortly after she was born Jan. 2, had apparently been kept in Mrs. Iavarone's furnished flat in Brooklyn ever since.

"So far as we know she never left the house with the child," McCabe said.

The woman quit her \$45-a-week job as a credit department clerk in a Brooklyn department store on the day the baby disappeared, police said.

Insists Baby is Hers

Officials said the woman claims she gave birth to the child herself that night alone in her second floor apartment at 90 St. Mark's Ave. "She insists the baby is hers," McCabe said.

However, he added, footprints of the kidnaped girl, born to Mr. and Mrs. Frank D. Chionchio, and that of the recovered baby are identical.

He also said a small mark on the baby's left eyelid, described by the father, showed the baby was the same one taken.

McCabe and other investigators refused to speculate about motives in the case.

Mrs. Iavarone, a woman with strong, reddish-blonde hair and ring-fingered fingernails, held the front of her dark coat over her face as she was led from the 84th Precinct house, where she had been questioned all night, to the 82d Precinct for booking.

McCabe said Mrs. Iavarone was married in 1933 to John Getch, divorced in 1940 and in 1942 or

Eisenhower Meets Mikoyan Saturday

Washington, Jan. 12 (AP)—President Eisenhower will meet with Soviet Deputy Premier Mikoyan at the White House Saturday.

The White House announced the conference will take place in the President's office at 9 a.m. Press secretary James C. Hagerty said no time limit has been set for the meeting.

Secretary of State Dulles and perhaps some other officials will be present, Hagerty said.

No further details were given but the meeting presumably will be a general review of East-West relations with emphasis on the Berlin situation.

Eisenhower is expected to impress upon Premier Nikita Khrushchev's top deputy that the western Allies have no intention of abandoning West Berlin or creating a neutralized Germany.

The Soviet visitor met with both Dulles and Vice President Nixon a week ago before starting his present tour around the country.

Interest in the forthcoming discussions, which some officials regard as a kind of little summit conference, was sharpened over the weekend by two surprise Moscow moves. Presumably timed with Mikoyan's presence here in mind, these moves were:

Hartford, Jan. 12 (AP)—A 3-alarm fire raged out of control for three hours in a 2-story building across from City Hall on Main St., early today.

Mother Relates Faith in God, FBI and Police

New York, Jan. 12 (AP)—"I never leave up that loss could be found. My first faith was in God. My second in the FBI and the police."

These were the words of a jubilant mother, Mrs. Frances Chionchio, for whom nine days of anxiety and agony ended early today with the safe recovery of her kidnaped infant daughter.

The 26-year-old high school teacher, who has been on maternity leave, said she first learned the baby was found alive and healthy from her husband, Frank, who telephoned from St. Peter's Hospital about 6:30 a.m.

She said she didn't know when she would be reunited with her child, but as long as she knew the baby was being cared for, she could wait.

Chionchio, 28, a Port Authority lawyer, had been called to the hospital for identification of the infant missing since the night of Jan. 2 when she was kidnaped 2 1/2 hours after birth.

Chionchio said he recognized his daughter immediately. He had on

Castro Reports Executions of 50 Batista Men

Havana, Jan. 12 (AP)—Executions of the followers of former dictator Fulgencio Batista are mounting in Cuba as the forces of rebel leader Fidel Castro continue to mop up military units.

Castro said about 50 Batista supporters have been executed. Nearly 3,000 are awaiting trial.

Asked on a U.S. television program yesterday (Face the Nation) why the Batista followers were being executed without open trials, Castro said: "There were not so many... Two or three dozen criminals."

"They were judged," he said, adding that "Johnson killed 15 or 20 people, he has no right to live."

The interview was recorded in Havana Saturday.

Bodies Found

Correspondent Jules Dubois of the Chicago Tribune reported that the mutilated bodies of 160 anti-Batista prisoners were found yesterday in a mass grave on the outskirts of San Cristobal, 60 miles west of Havana.

Military authorities in Manzanillo announced yesterday that Cuban firing squad executions of Batista supporters. But they will be allowed to see the bodies afterward.

Dallas, Tex., Jan. 12 (AP)—Evangelist Billy Graham went ahead with his plans for a world crusade today in the face of advice by physicians to curtail his activities because of an eye ailment.

Graham told reporters that he intends to go to Australia, Indonesia, Malaya, Cairo, Jerusalem and Berlin this year.

Waistlines are back where they should be, or slightly raised, skirts have enough room for walking, suits are comfortable and wearable, hemlines are back where a woman can go out and buy her 1959 Easter outfit without fear of her husband's rage at least so far as style is concerned.

Coast to Coast Boar

All these listings of joy, it seems, are largely the result of a mass male protest against the grotesque fashions of the last few seasons. Airliner Crash Kills 36 Near Airport in Rio

Rio de Janeiro, Brazil, Jan. 12 (AP)—Thirty-six persons were killed in a West German airliner which crashed and burned yesterday as it came in to land in heavy rain at Galeao International Airport.

Three crew members were the only survivors.

Among the dead were the American pilot, Capt. Wren McMeans, 48, Westover Park, Stamford, Conn., and 24-year-old Countess Maria Elena Kottulinsky of Vienna, daughter of Princess Ileana of Romania who now lives in Newton, Mass.

Count Jaroslav Kottulinsky died with his wife. The couple were on a combined business and pleasure trip to Brazil, where he has real estate interests.

The 4-engine Super-Constellation of the Lufthansa Airline was en route to Rio from Europe and Africa. A wingtip struck the mud of the marsh at the edge of Galeao Bay as the pilot tried to line up with a runway.

The German co-pilot, Karl Frank, was thrown clear. Stewardess Hilde Denler, and a steward

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
