No doubt the individual dope ad dict will commit crime to obtain money for narcotics if he cannot pay for them in any other way. Furthermore, the common picture of the agony of stopping drugs by a confirmed addict is probably all too accurate.

It is not possible to more than skim the surface of this complex social medical and legal problem in a few words. It is almost beyond doubt that no normal person reall, wants to become a drug addict.
It is generally believed that mos victims of the habit are those wh feel themselves inadequate to fac life, who have feelings of inferiority, who are social misfits ! some way, or who have been suffering from ill health and have unwisely taken these habit-forming drugs until they could not stop.
In referring to the drug habit one usually means of a craving fo one of the derivatives of opium, a

though cocaine and marihuana ca also be included among the habit forming drugs.
To opium and its derivatives. suffering humanity owes an enor mous debt, since these substance have been used over the centuries to relieve unbearable pain. But they cannot be used indefinitely without running the risk of developing a craving.

The symptoms of habit-formation come slowly. At first the health is little disturbed, but gradually the dose of the drug used has to be increased in order to produce the wanted pleasurable sen-

and often suffers from vague symptoms in the digestive tract or elsewhere whenever the effects of the drug have worn off. This leads towards more frequent use of the particular drug and the need for larger doses until the addict is completely at the mercy of the dope rings or peddlers who supply the drug.

The treatment of fully-established drug addiction is difficult, indeed. It is best given in an institution since the results are likely to be better if temptation is fully removed.

Chicago, Jan. 14 (R)-Terry Brennan's dismissal as head football coach does not mean that Notre Dame is turning into a football factory, says the Rev. Theodore Hesburgh, university president. In a copyrighted article appearing in a national magazine (Sports Illustrated), Father Hesburgh defended

the school's action in firing Brennan and hiring Joe Kuharich as a change for the better. He called the move a "commitment to excellence, and the judgment that the performance would be bettered by the change."

Apparently irked over publicity given the matter, Father Hesburgh said: "While I can appreciate the wide national interest in sports, I think it somewhat of an inversion of values that a university can appoint 20 distinguished professors. make broad and significant changes in academic person-

nel to achieve greater excellence, without attracting

more than a slight ripple of attention. "But let the same university make a well-considered change in athletic personnel for the same reason, and it sparks the ill-considered charge that it is no longer a first-rate academic institution and must henceforth be considered a football factory.
