Hal Boyle Is The White Collar Badge of Slavery?

New York (AP)—The look of Manhattan is changing rapidly now under the impetus of the greatest face-lifting program in municipal history.

Old landmarks are being torn down and new landmarks are rising as the brisk winds of the present blow the dust of the past in the pedestrian's eye.

At lunch hour, particularly in fair weather, the sites of the climbing new skyscrapers are surrounded by pale-faced office peons. They are fascinated by the sight of their fellow men earning a living by the sweat of their brow and the use of their hands under the open sky.

Watching a couple of steelworkers nonchalantly stroll across a girder high overhead, one office peon turned to a friend and said:

"They are men. They are real men!"

In his voice was a mixture of admiration and wistful envy—a conscious expression of the realization that in the aristocracy of manhood the outdoor man has an edge over the indoor man.

The wife of the indoor man may feel that her husband is superior in some nebulous way to the rugged outdoor man, but the husband himself has no such illusion. He often feels his white collar is more of a badge of slavery than a symbol of success.

The indoor man, caught in the gray drapery of civilization, often finds it hard to see the importance of his work—whether he merely shuffles papers, sells neckties, arranges divorces, writes toothpaste ads, or answers the telephone for someone else above him in the office hierarchy.

He often has a trapped feeling.

He has left nature too far behind; he can control his climate by turning a knob at home or at the office.

Sometimes as he does this he can hear life whistling by in the wind outside his window. And he knows he is missing something.

The indoor man misses the joy of natural achievement that comes to the outdoor man—the farmer raising crops, the sailor taking a ship across the sea, the forester quelling a timber fire, even the bricklayer raising the wall of a new home.

The greater creature comforts he enjoys do not compensate the indoor man for what he has lost. He neither awakes nor freezes at his job. He is usually lukewarm—and knows it.

The outdoor man realizes this fact, and as a result he always feels he has a clear and definite edge over the indoor man. The humiliated indoor carrier cannot help looking down on a lawyer—that is, if he isn't in the lawyer's office.

The indoor man does the paper work of civilization and most of his problems are nervous ones. He is essential but often doesn't feel he is. The outdoor man, on the other hand, does the muscular work of civilization, and he can see the result of his labors in visible growth—a stand of waving wheat, a new road through a swamp, a bridge across a river, a new building in the skyline. He is essential, and he knows it.

Inside every indoor man, home-sick for nature, is an outdoor man yearning to be free. But only old age or entombment will drive the outdoor man indoors, and he is never again as happy.

Redstone Arsenal Jobs Community In Jobless Study

Redstone Arsenal, Ala. — The Army's electronic tabulating equipment here is being used in a cooperative community effort to decrease unemployment in the city of Huntsville.

Heading a 6-man committee which is analyzing the situation is Robert F. Melio, director of civilian personnel at the Army Ordnance Missile Command, who thinks the project will result in "a new approach to handling unemployment information. We are actually doing an engineering job on our work force."

Basic facts about some 3,000 jobless people in the community are supplied by the Huntsville office of the Alabama Employment Service and are recorded on punch cards. Fed into the Arsenal's tabulating machines, the cards can be sorted in a few minutes to give a description of the unemployed group from any number of points of view.

Melio's committee of the Society for Personnel Administration was formed after a Huntsville industrialist urged a community effort to make sure that all of its members have a chance to earn a living.

UAW, Harvester Reach Agreement

Chicago, Jan. 14 (AP)—International Harvester Co. and the United Auto Workers early today reached an agreement on a new three-year contract for 27,000 employees who have been on strike for two months.

Spokesman for the company and union announced the agreement after a lengthy session which extended into the early morning hours.

The agreement, it is said, will provide for an annual pay increase of 6 cents an hour or 2 1/2 per cent, whichever is greater, and the length of the new pact—three years. The new contract covers the period from last Aug. 22 to Oct. 1, 1961. Wages under the old contract averaged \$2.55 an hour.

Satisfaction by the workers would result in resumption of operations by Monday, a company spokesman said.

Two federal mediators and a private mediator had been holding highly confidential talks with the company and UAW representatives throughout several days in an effort to reach a settlement.

The principal gains under the new contract, the spokesman said, were an annual pay increase of 6 cents an hour or 2 1/2 per cent, whichever is greater, and the length of the new pact—three years. The Doctor Says

By EDWIN F. JORDAN, M.D. Writter for NEA Service

I am inclined to feel that the common notion of drug addiction is a law-abiding citizen, a respectable, unobtrusive, and unobtrusive person. However, dope peddlers and narcotic rings are certainly working against the welfare of the rest of us.

No doubt the individual dope addict will commit crime to obtain money for narcotics if he cannot pay for them in any other way. Furthermore, the common picture of the agony of stopping drugs by a confirmed addict is probably all too accurate.

It is not possible to more than skim the surface of this complex social, medical and legal problem in a few words. Certainly one of the basic problems to know more about what causes drug or narcotic addiction, it is almost beyond doubt that no normal person really wants to become a drug addict.

It is generally believed that most victims of the habit are those who feel themselves inadequate to face life, who have feelings of inferiority, who are socially "out" in some way, or who have been suffering from ill health and have unwisely taken these habit-forming drugs until they could not stop.

In referring to the habit, one usually means of a craving for one of the derivatives of opium, although cocaine and marijuana can also be included among the habit-forming drugs.

To opium and its derivatives, suffering humanity owes an enormous debt, since these substances have been used over the centuries to relieve unbearable pain. But they cannot be used indefinitely without running the risk of developing a craving.

The symptoms of habit-formation come slowly. At first the health is little disturbed, and gradually the dose of the drug used has to be increased in order to produce the wanted pleasurable sensation.

On the habit has been finally formed, the victim of drug addiction becomes mentally depressed and often suffers from vague symptoms in the digestive tract or elsewhere whenever the effects of the drug have worn off. This leads to a craving for more of the particular drug and the need for larger doses until the addict is at the mercy of the dope rings or peddlers who supply the drug.

The treatment of fully-established drug addiction is difficult indeed. It is best given in an institution since the results are likely to be better if temptation is fully removed.

The greatest effort in the control of narcotic addiction should be directed toward the prevention of particularly youngsters of high school age, of the dangers of starting down this path. Our efforts to smash the dope rings and vicious elements of society which are producing so many innocent victims to disaster.

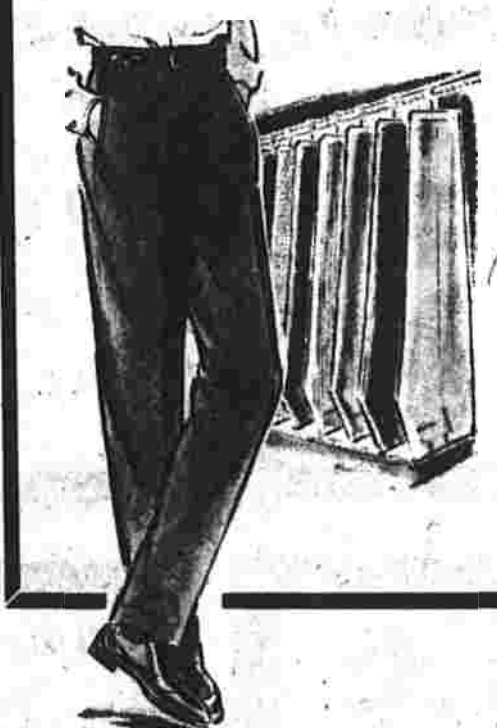

Taxpayers League Set For Fluoridation Vote

The Manchester Taxpayers' League will meet Monday to vote on a recommendation of its executive board that a petition be circulated to force a referendum on fluoridation.

Tilbur Bennett, president, said the special League meeting will be held at 8 p.m. in the Bowers School auditorium.

Bennett is opposed, not specifically to fluoridation but to the fact that the health measure was passed here by the Board of Directors of the Board of Directors rather than by ordinance.

The Board last month authorized the Water Department to install fluoridation equipment in the town water supply. Bennett feels this action should have been put into the form of an ordinance which would have required a public hearing before passage.

The Board's action was a "violation of democratic principles," he said, in that townpeople should have been given a chance to express themselves on the controversial subject.

A recent poll of about 20 per cent of the League showed strong support for putting fluoridation to a townwide vote, Bennett said. The League has some 1,000 members, the vast majority of whom live on the West Side. The organization was formed in protest of the city's fluoridation plan here in 1956.

The entrance requirement is \$1 per family.

Members of the executive board, besides Bennett, are former director Walter Mahoney, vice president, Clifford Eastenberg, secretary, Joseph Sullivan, treasurer, and Oliver Jarvis.

Bennett, who is in his second term as president, said the executive board holds bi-monthly meetings but that meetings of the entire membership are rare. He is hoping for a turnout of 10 per cent to get a 40 per cent majority vote.

He said he "doesn't expect too much trouble" in rounding up 40 per cent. Sixty people will be enough to circulate the petition, he said, and the aim will be 1,200 to 1,500 signatures.

A referendum will have to be called if a petition signed by 10 per cent of the town's voters demanding passage of an anti-fluoridation ordinance is not acted upon by the Board of Directors within 45 days.

Provision \$100 Fine

Bennett said he has an anti-fluoridation ordinance which would provide a \$100 fine for each offense of fluoridating the town's public water supply. It was drawn up, he said, by attorney who asked not to be identified.

Bennett said the ordinance is for the entire town, and petitions will be circulated on this basis. The North End is served by the privately owned Manchester Water Co.

The petitions will be distributed at the Bowers School meeting and League "captains" will divide the town into circulation areas.

Each member circulating a petition will carry a "statement of intent" showing signs that the purpose of the League's action is not to defeat fluoridation but to get a "democratic" vote on it, Bennett said.

Bennett's push for a referendum follows suggestions he made to the Board of Directors last week for getting public opinion on whether fluoridation is wanted here.

The suggestions, on which the Board took no action, were:

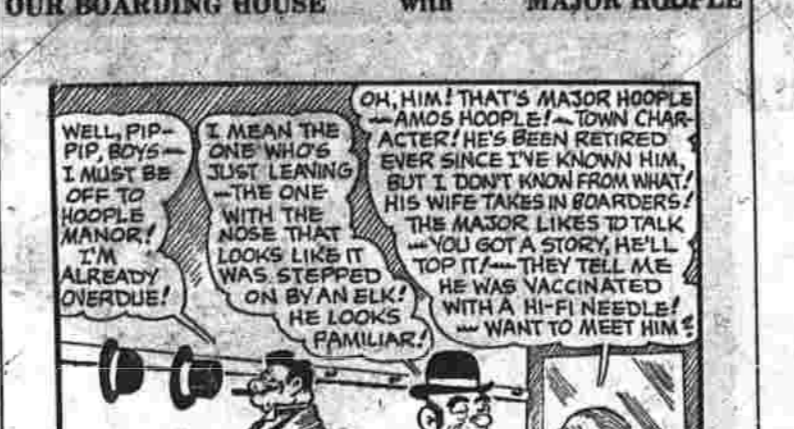
