AEC Chief Quits Post

Washington, Feb. 18 (AP)—Dr. Willard F. Libby resigned from the Atomic Energy Commission today. He said he had to go back to teaching and research. "If I am to remain a scientist," he said.

Libby, the only member of the 5-man commission with an extensive scientific background, made his resignation effective June 30.

The resignation was announced at the White House.
