Moscow, Feb. 23 (AP)—A riotous student welcome greeted Prime Minister Harold Macmillan today when he visited Tsvetkov Moscow University with a message of good will from British youth. Thousands of youngsters jammed corridors and fought their way up and down elevators in the 32-story building.

Hoffa Reports Gains In Cement Industry

Teamsters boss James R. Hoffa said today his union's efforts to organize in the South will be a hard and costly campaign. "But we're making good gains," Hoffa said as he and the Teamsters executive board began a 4-day strategy conference in Miami Beach, Fla.

Hoffa told a news conference that the union's progress in the cement industry was especially encouraging. "I think we'll organize the whole industry," Hoffa said. "That's very important because cement is necessary to construction, and construction is about the biggest industry down here."

Hoffa said that employees of lumber yards, supply yards, cement block shops and vending machine firms also will be on the organizing agenda.

More pay, not shorter hours, was Hoffa's idea of what his Teamsters want.

"The average worker would rather have a raise in pay than a 35-hour week," he said. "They're just not interested in reducing hours at this time if wages remain static."

32 Months Space Hop Man to Land on Mars In 10 Years: Von Braun

The first U.S. manned space expedition will land on the planet Mars in 10 to 15 years, scientists predict.

"In the not too distant future such a trip can be made and has to be made," the Army's top space experts said yesterday in Winter Park, Fla.

Dr. Werner von Braun, technical director of the Army Ballistic Missile Agency, and three of his colleagues outlined the journey in a lecture at Rollins College.

Von Braun described the expedition as "the crowning achievement in the man-in-space program (Project Mercury) now in progress."

The scientists said the round trip, using two giant spaceships, would be completed in 32 months. The best opportunity will come next on Aug. 5, 1971 when the two planets are in closest relation—34.6 million miles.

Von Braun, German-born missile pioneer, shared the rostrum with ABEA deputy technical director Eberhard F. M. Rees; Arthur Rulphoff, project director of the Solid Fuel Pershing Missile Program and Fritz Mueller, deputy director of the ABEA's guidance and Control Laboratory.

Ike May Make Stronger Fight For Aid Funds

Washington, Feb. 23 (AP)—President Eisenhower is reported ready to make an even stronger fight than last year for support of his \$3,930,000,000 foreign aid request.

Some Republican leaders say they are convinced he would veto and demand reconsideration of any bill which cut deeply into the program he proposed.

Democratic leaders have indicated they may slice the mutual assistance program to offset increases in other outlays above the President's requests in his \$77 billion budget.

With this in mind, Eisenhower reportedly has told associates he fears the United States might eventually be pushed back into a garrisoned hemisphere unless foreign military and economic aid is carried on at a high level.

In talks to Republican leaders at White House conferences, Eisenhower is said to have cited Viet Nam, with 125,000 men under arms, as an example of a country where defense support is absolutely necessary.

The President's reiterated statement that he stands firmly behind his foreign aid proposals apparently has had the effect of whipping up more Republican backing for the program than has been available sometimes in the past.

Senate Democratic leader Lyndon B. Johnson of Texas has made the public claim, for instance, that he helped restore funds to last year's program after there had been bipartisan votes in the House to cut the amounts.

Eisenhower himself worked both publicly and privately last year to drum up support for his program. But although the final figure was \$440 million more than the House had voted, it still fell \$652 million

British Release 900 Held for Cyprus Unrest

Nicosia, Feb. 23 (AP)—Greek Cypriots celebrated wildly as the British turned loose more than 900 political prisoners yesterday. Only two incidents marred the jubilation.

The detainees had been held without trial under emergency regulations as suspected members of EOKA, the Greek Cypriot underground which has been waging a terrorist campaign against the British since 1955.

The government announced all detention camps on the island were being closed and emergency regulations lifted. The action had been assured by the agreement last Thursday in London to give Cyprus independence, but the release of the prisoners came quicker than expected.

Hundreds of other Cypriots imprisoned after conviction of violating the emergency regulations were not affected by the first amnesty. But many of these are expected to get reduced terms or release soon.

The barred wire gates of the Mammari and Kokkinotrimithia detention camps swung open shortly after 3 p.m. yesterday, a stream of buses, jammed with detainees and with some riding on the roofs, headed for Nicosia. Greek flags and EOKA banners, apparently hidden in the camps, were unfurled. The detainees banged on the sides of the buses, shouting "Long live Makarios" and "Long live EOKA."

British troops living in tents along the routes to the capital waved and hurled mild ribaldries.

Tito Pledges To Aid Mideast Quit Cold War

Damascus, Feb. 23 (AP)—Yugoslav President Tito pledged all-out support last night for efforts by UAR President Nasser to pull the Middle East out of the East-West Cold War.

Tito told a banquet given in his honor by Nasser: "You can rest assured that Yugoslavia will continuously support your efforts to pull this area out of the Cold War and to ensure the right of its peoples to self-determination and to settle their problems through peaceful means and in conformity with their private circumstances and aspirations."

Nasser and Tito arrived from Cairo yesterday for celebrations on the first anniversary of the merging of Egypt and Syria into the United Arab Republic. More than 50,000 Syrians cheered as Nasser, in a balcony appearance, said the Arabs can achieve their goal of unity if they close ranks against "opportunists, reactionaries and imperialists."

Nasser declared the Arab world would not be deceived by false slogans of freedom and liberation raised by these three categories of opponents. He did not further identify opponents, but followed his statement with a reassertion of his government's "positive neutrality"

Proxmire Protests Rule by Johnson Ike Has Parley With Dulles at Army Hospital

Washington, Feb. 23 (AP)—Senator William Proxmire (D-Wis.) protested today that Senate Democratic leader Lyndon B. Johnson of Texas runs the party program in the Senate without consulting other Democratic Senators.

"The typical Democratic Senator has literally nothing to do with determining the legislative program and policies of this party in the Senate," Proxmire said in a speech prepared for delivery in the Senate.

Although lauding the abilities and drive of Johnson, Proxmire demanded that the 64 Democratic Senators be called together for a conference or caucus before major party decisions are taken on legislation.

"The majority in the Senate is generally responsible also to the majority of the nation," he said, "but the majority leader, under present conditions, is not."

Proxmire, referring to himself in third person according to Senate tradition, said: "Mr. President, the junior Senator from Wisconsin, wasn't sent to this body to delegate his authority as a Senator to any other Senator no matter how able, wise, or good that Senator may be."

Johnson is in Texas. He flew there with President Eisenhower Wednesday. Office aides said they did not know when he planned to return.

Sen. Mike Mansfield of Montana, acting Democratic leader, said Johnson has influenza and may not return to Washington until Thursday.

Proxmire said he plans a series of speeches on what he called the concentration of Senate power. "I think I can show in the course of these speeches that there never has been a time when power has been so sharply concentrated as it is today in the Senate," he said.

Proxmire said some party members might believe that the complaint he was voicing publicly was a matter that ought to be discussed privately behind closed doors.

Disagreeing, Proxmire said the issue "is very much the public's business."

"The public has a right to sit in on a full critical discussion of who exercises this power, how and why," he said.

He said he had not discussed his protest speeches in advance with Johnson or other Senate Democratic leaders because past efforts at change by this method had failed.

Craft Rams Mountain in Heavy Fog

Danbury, Feb. 23 (AP)—Four Patterson, N. Y., persons, including two youths, were killed today when a private plane crashed and burned "after a terrific roar and explosion" on Pine Mountain.

The charred bodies of the victims were found strapped to their seats in the plane's wreckage by a rescue party.

State Police later carried the bodies down through about a mile of rough terrain and brought them to a funeral home at nearby Ridgefield.

State Police said the pilot was Eugene Brandon, an employee of the Danbury School of Aeronautics.

His three passengers, who were headed for New York's LaGuardia Field to meet a friend, were identified as:

"Emerson Smith, about 40, a self-employed carpenter and father of four children.

His son, Joseph, about 14.

And his cousin, David Sprague, about 15.

The plane, a new Piper Comanche, purchased only last Dec. 30, went down about 5:45 a.m. in a heavy fog.

Bob Lutz, assistant city editor of the Danbury News Times and among the first to reach the scene, said:

"It was just a mess. There was very little left of the plane, and the bodies."

Jerry Hoyt, a Danbury milkman, was the first to notify police of the crash. Said Hoyt:

"I was delivering milk on Spruce Mountain Rd. when I saw the plane taking off from the nearby airport.

"I heard the engine roaring like thunder. A split second later, it seemed, I heard a terrific explosion and saw a flash."

After notifying police, Hoyt drove to the airport where he was met by State Trooper Charles Lundberg. The two drove up Spruce Mountain Road in a State Police car from which the milkman pointed directions.

Lundberg then returned to the airport from where he and the pilot went up and within 10 minutes spotted smoke on pine mountain.

"We hardly could see through the heavy fog," said the trooper, "but we did manage to get peaks
