





A. Turkish Foreign communique denounced as "completely baseless propaganda" an earlier Pravda report chrging that the revolt had been planned by the Baghdad Pact members. The communique said Turkey was maintaining friendly relations with the "legitimate Iraqi government" and not meddling in the internal affairs of any nation.

The conflict also had repercussions in Lebanon. Communists and upporters of Nasser clashed in Baalbeck and three persons were reported injured. Police arrested a large number from both factions.

Weather Pattern Found

Canberra Australian research scientists report that they have discovered a weather pattern ruling at altitudes above 20 miles which they believe reflects the seasons experienced on the earth's surface. Their experiments, using talloons at altitudes of 30 miles over an extensive area, showed for the first time that wind changes are rimultaneous through para-latitude centers. The data is expected to help in forcasting seasonal weather throughout the world.
