





Bolton Population May Jump To 6,000 in 20 Years

Bolton must consider the likelihood that it will be a community of about 6,000 people in 1980. This is one of the basic statements in the report made to the Education Advisory Committee by its subcommittee on population this week.

The report, written by James Kier, comments that growth in a small community usually comes in spurts and makes short range planning more difficult than long range planning. It adds that a 20-year look ahead is a "reasonable necessity" for the planning of a major community program such as education.

Other members of the committee included James G. Hasset, chairman of the Town Planning Commission; State Rep. Dorothy R. Miller; the Commission's secretary, and Milton Jensen.

In commenting on past trends, the report says, "With the rapidly expanding building boom in the late 1940's, Bolton began a rapid shift from a rural community to a suburban community. This shift has been an extremely rapid growth in the school system, from 241 in 1945 to 608 as of June, 1958. It will be noted that this growth has been considerably more rapid than the growth of the population. This is mainly shifting from a rural to a suburban character. Statistically, the school enrollment in 1958 compared but 18 per cent of the population but has grown to 24.6 per cent today. . . Growth during the

past year averages nearly 10 per cent. The population in 1958 was 4,300. A high projected trend, a possible "low" is indicated on the chart at 3,950. An unexpected boom might produce 7,400 people.

The committee states flatly there is no way in which a community can accurately predict its future population. In regard to zoning regulations, the report states Bolton's present requirements probably effect a "holding power" but other communities in the Capitol Region, it continues, have been "upgrading" their zoning and a balance has again been nearly attained.

It calls continued "upgrading" to beat one's neighbor unreasonable and predicts it is unlikely Bolton will avoid the proper portion of growth which "will impinge upon it from Manchester and Hartford. The best any town can hope to do is to plan for cooperation with the inevitable. A step in the same technique will be wisely disastrous."

The population chart, submitted with the report, covers a period from 1950 to 1980. The line which leads to the committee's figure of 6,100 people in 1980 falls short of some unofficial guesses.
