Doctors Report Cancer Spread To Neck Area

Washington, April 15 (AP)—Secretary of State John Foster Dulles apparently is suffering from apical cancer in his lower neck.

A new report from his doctors was taken by some medical authorities here to mean that the abdominal cancer with which he was stricken has spread into at least one other section of his body.

X-ray studies suggest the possibility that a new cancer had been found, although it could be a recurrence of the cancer in the neck.

The new medical report on Dulles' cancer was announced by a State Department press officer Lincoln White, who announced his findings, reported that Dulles had "experienced increasing discomfort in the lower neck" in recent days.

### Sikorsky's S60 Viewed As Flying Workhorse

A demonstration of Sikorsky's latest helicopter, the S60, is being held today in a picture of a flying workhorse whose versatility not only opens up unlimited commercial horizons but also provides the United States with a fantastic new weapon.

More than 50 newsmen, photographers and military observers attended the show staged outside the Stratford Plant Monday to watch as the S60 was put through its paces for the first time publicly. The demonstration came just nine months after the work began on assembling the giant, unconventional, designed helicopter which has been dubbed the "flying crane" because of its terrific lifting ability and maneuverability.

Watch Fascinated

Although the spectators had been well briefed on what to expect, they still watched with fascination as the aircraft, wind-milled its way through the air like a large dragonfly, powered for a second or two over the runway, and then rose without apparent effort bearing at the end of its self-contained cable a 60-foot-long, 4,500-pound Army bridge and bore it off across the field.

Earlier the "flying crane" picked up a weighted dummy of an Honest John missile, flew around the field and then gently set it down on a designated spot on the runway.

At the end of the demonstration, a 2-ton utility pole was plucked from the ground as an example of the type of work already being performed by the S60, a predecessor of the one on display today. Incorporated in the S60 along with those from other Sikorsky helicopters, are:

A short while ago the S60

planted 63 poles down a steep, almost inaccessible mountain slope in California in less than two days — an assignment which, because of the rugged country, would have taken about 85 days by conventional means. Preliminary figures showed that the helicopter had done the task for about \$70 a pole, compared with \$250 a pole using block and tackle and manpower.

The S60, which company officials say will cost a commercial firm \$100,000 to purchase (\$60,000 for basic airframe and equipment, \$40,000 for the two E260 Pratt & Whitney Aircraft engines, and \$10,000 for the hoist) but that the aircraft will soon pay for itself in resultant savings in man-hours, transportation costs and equipment usage.

See Limited Feasibility

While the demonstration itself was impressive, even more so were the words of company officials who spoke at a briefing session earlier on the almost limitless possibilities of the S60 in commercial, military and humanitarian work. A number of countries are already showing interest in the helicopter for establishing greater mobility of the country's fighting forces was also sounded.

See Limited Feasibility

Officials said the S60 can carry a four to six ton payload external for distances up to 100 miles at a speed in excess of 100 miles an hour but most work will be done at around 100 knots.

Other crane models under design will have lifting capacities ranging from five to 20 tons.

There are some of the things which, they said, the "flying crane" can do or can do now:

- Lift and carry all personnel, military or other ships; lift and place prefabricated houses in inaccessible territory; carry bulldozers and other heavy construction equipment.
- Transport troops to isolated locations and maneuver without regard to bridges, roads and rough terrain. Navy vessels could be supplied while at sea and in an amphibious assault, troops and supplies could be lifted from ships to a pinpoint location on shore instead of shuttling from transport to landing craft to beach to trucks and then to their final destination, a procedure which was followed during World War II.
- The importance of establishing such mobility was emphasized by selected E. Ghisner, Sikorsky engineering manager, who said it seems that almost all proposed military units have come to the conclusion that the mobility of ground forces is one of the most important factors in the development of the helicopter to furnish this mobility while at the same time proceeding in the research of new vehicles for the future.

### McCormick Says Cuts Threaten Teacher Pay

Board of Education Chairman, Charles McCormick, has threatened a reduction in staff and teachers' salaries if town directors uphold cuts made in the education budget by General Manager Richard Martin. McCormick made his remarks at a public hearing on Martin's tentative budget for 1959-60 at the Wadsworth School. He said Martin's proposed cut of \$112,201 out of the School Board budget, if approved by the Directors, would adversely affect the school program and cause "retrogression" in all along the line. The education request of \$1,777,851 was "light" and "not over-demanding," he said. "I can bear 'em down' tomorrow," Martin pruned the request to \$1,685,000. He cut \$22,754 from staff expenses and \$79,537 from other items. McCormick called "new equipment and capital outlay." Martin said staff expenses were being requested while only 40 more pupils will be added to the school system next year. "See Duplication" In capital outlay, he said, projects requested that the school board has already included in a 6-year capital improvement program which will be completed in a program for the town as a whole. "The staff expense item was defended last night by School Board member Harold Garity, and the capital outlay item by Board member Frank Shoberg. Garity said a fair compromise was reached in negotiations with teachers and custodial salaries for next year, pointing out that town directors act in the fall. He said administrators, teachers, custodians and maintenance workers made very "unhappy" by approval of Martin's cut and subsequent reductions in salary through all jobs. Shoberg said the capital outlay request covered projects put off continually because of past budget-cutting by Martin and the Directors. Included, he said, are lighting and fire prevention improvements and repairs that can't be delayed any longer. Mentions Terminals Giving one instance, he said budget-cutting neglect of a termite problem in the Bowers School. Now termite are in the auditorium floor, he said. McCormick called for a meeting between his Board and the Directors to discuss the capital projects and assign a priority to them. On the staff request, he said that while only 40 more pupils are forecast for next year, more are needed because of a large senior class and because of a farm-out program for some Junior-high schoolers that deprives them of centralized laboratory and activity facilities. McCormick added that the School Board's mission is to meet educational needs economically. "and we have fulfilled that obligation." He said figures from Superintendent of Schools Arthur Fling show the average annual per pupil cost here has trailed the State average for the past five years. The cost here is \$34.50 per pupil, he said. Budget Studied He said the budget reflects the "best thinking" of school administrators, Board members, teachers, and workers after long study. Teachers and townpeople also spoke up in support of the school request. Winslow Manchester, 253 Holliston St., told the directors to shorten budget and set a tax rate by May 7. They will meet tonight at 8 p.m. in the Municipal Building for a workshop session on proposed budgets for: Engineering, highways, snow removal and sanding, street lighting, sidewalks and curbs, garbage collection and disposal, cemeteries, building inspection, municipal building, and new school construction administration.
