The bill was signed into law by the Governor March 7, 1958.

"The City of New York which turned down fluoridation, analyzed the water from many faucets of the homes of some 20 cities including those in which good results are claimed, and in no place was there uniformity of dose level, which ranged from zero to twice the recommended dose." it is for the physician of kidney patients to prescribe fluoride-free water for them. Dr. Charles A. Brusch, of Brusch Medical Center, Cambridge, Mass., states: "Extensive pharmo-dynamic research from reliable sources leave us speechless when we think of a plan to fluoride the public water supply of the entire nation. Acute and chronic as the ffects are sure to be, it can only be classified as mass murder."

The proponents readily admit that fluoridation will be the cause of some children having mottled teeth. I ask you fathers and mothers how would you like to have your son or nughter disfigured for life ?

One could go on quoting many medical professors and doctors if space permitted, who have come to the conclusion that artificial fluorides are detrimental to health when taken

Nothing has been made public as to the probable cost of fluoridating the water. In ad dition to the expense of the equipment and the labor to maintain and service it, it is a well established fact that fluorides have a very corrosive action on metal. It will most assuredly attack the entire distribution system including the wooden pipe line from Glastonbury an the mechanical equipment at the new million dollar sewage disposal plant. Schenectady, N. Y., discontinued fluoridation when it was estimated to cost \$30,000 to

repair the fluoride pumps and connecting pipes. It would seem to me-the most sensible thing to do instead of spending the money on fluoridation would be to improve our present water supply. According to a recent survey made for the Town, a large sum of money (\$363,000 if I remember correctly) should imme-

liately be spent to improve the quality of the water and provide adequate fire protection. To this will undoubtedly necessitate a substantial increase in water and sewer rates, with a prospective 5 mill increase in the general tax, the burden on the home owner will be a heavy load.

There, my reader, is the story as I see it. Every time you make a cup of coffee, pot of soup or cook a vegetable you are getting, against your will, a dose of poison, the effect of which may not be immediate but the results will be inevitable. That's why I am against fluoridation.






