### **Dentists Talk On Fluorides**

Benefits of fluoridation and "fear tactics" used to block the measure were subjects of a recent public meeting at the Bowers School. Dr. Charles Jacobson, local fluoridation leader, reported today on the meeting whose main speakers were Dr. Leonard F. Menczer, chief of the Hartford health department's dentistry division, and Dr. W. Harry Sieman of New Canaan, leader of a citizen's committee which promoted a successful referendum vote on the public health measure in that town. The Manchester Citizens Committee for Fluoridation sponsored he Bowers School meeting. A fluoridation referendum has been set here definitely for April 28. The date had been tentative. Dr. Jacobson today said Dr. Menczer spoke of the dental health enefits of fluoridation, and said that many chemicals exist in water supplies, both natural and those added for purification. Dr. Sieman, said Dr. Jacobson, discussed the unsuccessful campaign of what he called "false rumors, misrepresentation, and fear"

ceding the New Canaan referen-Dr. Jacobson said the New Canaan dentist identified some widely-displayed anti-fluoridation photographs of mottled teeth as showing the results of drinking 8 to 14 parts per million of fluoride rather than the prescribed one part. 

A "We know without question or doubt," states Dr. Nicholas C. Leone, Chief of Medical Investigation for the National Institute of Dental Research, "that one part per million fluoride in a water supply is absolutely safe, is beneficial and is not productive of any undesirable systemic effect in man."

Its accumulated ill effects present a problem with which professional manpower at its present level cannot cope." Miss Hazel Hooey, dental hygienist in the Manchester Schools, states that Manchester's school children have more than 9,000 cavities and that the situation is getting worse each year.

The Public Health Service has resorted to propaganda in favor of fluoridation and has succumbed to many of the evils which are attendant upon a dogmatic position. When officialdom ar-rogantly assumes an air of infallibility and an attitude of indifference to the public, then serious danger lurks in high places. While many opponents of fluoridation rest their case on moral and con-

stitutional grounds, there exists an abundance of scientific evidence which demonstrates the alarming danger of Writing with cold objectivity and with precision, the authors dissect and expose the barrenness of the claims favoring fluoridation unmercifully, but with

scholarly distinction. How a program of such magnitude, resting as it does on such a feeble foundation, has achieved such popularity is a deplorable tribute to the machinery of propaganda and a disheartening commentary on the super-ficiality of some so-called experts. The engineering difficulties and dangers in fluoridating water are presented in a chapter which should make the readers thankful for the water engineers who apparently know their business well. This should be required reading for medical and dental societies at all levels and all public health commissioners Chairmen of public health committees are duty bound to read this book and report to their parent organizations which all too often have endorsed fluoridation in parrot-like fashion totally unaware of the case against fluoridation. Proponents of fluoridation must refute the charges contained therein, an un-
