caticus. The white paper charged that the Governor's plan to tie together the highway fund diversion and continued state school grants was "an evasive factic to fool the pub-" The document charged the move was an "admission that the diversion proposal can not stand on its own merits."

The document was believed to be the first so-named paper issued by a party in the Legislature. The paper charged that the Governor's budget does not do the job in education, health and highways. The Republicans also reiterated their contentions that the hudget "is a radical departure from sound financial practice."

Another caucus was scheduled on the budget for next week, and the Republican leaders indicated the party may come up with some counter recommend tions to Governor Abraham Ribicoff's budget proposals.

Byrnes said that among the photographs in police possession were those of a "number of brothers who came from different cities throughout the United States and from Cuba," and that several had criminal records. He gave no further information to newsmen regarding them. In alerting all commands, police took the unusual sten of trans ting the information by messenger ather than sending it over the police teletype network, which inks all precincts.
