





Report on the Scientific Aspects of Fluoridation by the Manchester High School Science Club

HISTORY

Since the problem of fluoridation of a community's water supply for the express purpose of preventing tooth decay has been and is topic of much scientific interest and subject to a great deal of controversy and misinformation, the Manchester High School Science Club has undectaken this investigation. At the suggestion of the President of the Manchester Medical Association, the club members decided to undertake an evaluation of the pros and cons of this subject. Accordingly, the club members launched on much a program on approximately Feb. 15, 1959. As a group of young people interested in science the club was not interested or concerned with the political legal or moral aspects of the problem but only in the scientific aspects-that is only in whether fluoridation as a public health measure was harmful or beneficial to a human being

Automatic safety devices do exist with a good safety factor to prevent overdose of the fluoride in the water. 



This waterworks employee isn't taking any chances with deadly fluoride. The label on this sack of fluoride warns that it is a deadly polson. It reads: "May be fatal if inhaled or swallowed. Keep away from feed or food. Avoid breathing. Wash thoroughly after handling. Sweep up spillage." Many Florida cities are being urged to add fluoride to drinking water, on the contention it will belp prevent cavities in children's teeth. What effect it may have on health of older people has not been determined. Fluoridation of public drinking water amounts to mass medication and has been rejected in most cases where citizens have been permitted to express themselves by the ballot.

New Britain Herald, March 7.-New Britain, the only Fluoridated City in Connecticut, suffers frequent breakdowns in Fluoridation equipment. No Fluoride used in the last four months since November 16. State Health Department has not reported the absence of fluoride in their monthly water tests. Assistant Water Superintendent Fred Sarra further stated that each 400-lb. drum containing fluoride is carefully marked "Poisonous." "If we were to introduce more than one part per million of sodium fluoride into the water, we would have to shut off the city's water supply, as it would possibly be poisonous." Sodium fluoride costs about \$8,000 per year. There have been frequent breakdowns, according to the filtration plant operators; the present machine is the third the city has had since the Fluoridation system was installed in 1950.

A crew of men from the steel mpany has been working on the quipment during the week, a pokesman said.

Hvatt was walking along the arking lot roadway about 50 feet on the explosion. No one else was in the vicinity at the time. No one knew where Hyatt was headed when he was killed. Nothing inside the Willgoos facility was damaged, a
