The owner or agent of any building or premises where a violation of any provision of said Regulations shall have been committed or exist shall be guilty of a misdemsanor punishable by a fine of not less than ten dellars (\$10.00) and not more than one hundred dollars (\$100.00) for each and every day that such violation continues.

SECTION 12. ZONING BOARD OF APPEALS

The Zoning Board of Appeals shall have the following powers and duties:

1. Hear and decide appeals where it is alleged there is error in any order, requirements or decision made by the anforcing agency in the enforcement of these Regulations.

2. Where a zone boundary line divides a lot in a single ownership at the time of the adoption of these Regulations, permit a use authorized on either portion of such lot to extend to the entire lot, but not more than twenty-five (25) feet beyond the boundary line of the zone in which such use is authorized.

3. Adopt from time to time such raises and procedures as may be deemed necessary to carry into effect the provisions of these Regulations.

4. Authorize on appeal, variances from the strict application of the provisions of these Regulations to a specific lot or piece of property where, by reason of exceptional shape, exceptional disposinably or other exceptional situation or conditions, unusual difficulty or unreasonable hardship would result to the owners of said property; provided that relief can be granted without impairment of the integrity of these Regulations and without substantial detriment to the public welfars. Before any variance is granted, it shall be shown that there are special circumstances attached to the property which do not generally apply to other property in the same neighborhood.
