Democrats Answer Big 1959 Question

By GEORGE BAEAN

MANCHESTER, June 4 (AP)—This was the year the Democrats answered the question that has troubled Connecticut for its greatest test in the General Assembly.

The big question was the home rule amendment, open, five months ago now.

What would the Democrats do now that they controlled the State Legislature for the first time in 80 years?

One irrefutable answer the day after the election was that they would make history.

They made history by reversing the changes in the state's judicial and governmental structure.

And they gave Gov. Abraham Ribicoff every cent of the major objective he recommended in his second-term inaugural message.

The Democrats moved to repeal the State Constitution in January with a vote of 135-100, and they did not let the Democrats' Governor record a single legislative victory that had carried them to power.

They went home early this morning with a record of variously by veteran political writers and other informed observers as historic, momentous, incredible, or amazing.

Republicans on the other hand replied that any party which controlled both Houses and the Governor's office could do anything they pleased.

They charged the Democrats with heading the state toward bankruptcy and socialism, and they called the 1958 session a "sober slum" in which the Democrats had been elected to power.

These alone decide the real merits of the political arguments of the 1959 General Assembly.

Under Amendment 10, the Democrats with an almost invincible margin in the House, did these things:

Abolished the state's 330-year-old minor court system and replaced it with a new Circuit Court of 44 full-time judges.

Abolished the state's 285-year-old system of county government.

Approved the administration's \$100-million-dollar reorganization bill, including a general fund budget with no general tax increases.

Approved a \$444 million bond issue to pay for a federally aided, \$222 million "pay-as-you-grow" highway construction program.

Approved a \$87 million bonding issue for capital improvements and other state projects.

Established new state departments of Consumer Protection, Agriculture, Conservation and Natural Resources, and approved other administrative governmental reorganization plans designed to increase the efficiency of state operations.

Went passage of a highly controversial administration plan to divert some \$21 million from the state's highway fund to the general fund to help balance the budget.

The transferred money was earmarked for state grants to towns for education.

Approved another highly controversial measure to finance some \$12 million in state school construction grants by bonding instead of from current funds.

Abolished more than 100 special funds transferring them to the general fund and related numerous special fees—legal, business and professional.

This was the hard core of the Ribicoff program, as outlined in his inaugural and budget messages.

GOP Vote Help

But the Democrats won other legislative victories in numerous areas, in some cases with Republican votes that helped make the difference.

They suffered only one major reverse, but bounced back twice to salvage a partial victory.

This came during the final three days of the session as bill raising unemployment compensation benefits.

The original administration proposal was killed by Republicans in the House.

With the adjournment deadline rapidly approaching, the Democrats outmaneuvered Republican parliamentary questions brought in a vastly revised bill, and passed it.

Although the measure was far from what the Democrats and the state labor organizations wanted, passage of even a revised bill after the initial defeat was a triumph for the party organization.

In one major area the Democrats shared their victory with the Republicans.

This was on the bill abolishing the state's minor court system—a measure that produced the most dramatic surprise of the session.

On the day the debate was scheduled, a series of last-minute developments resulted in a compromise measure acceptable to the leaders of both parties.

GOP Leaders Renounced

This was a Republican move that left deep wounds in the party. These were faced with two weeks of the party's reorganization bill without a compromise.

But they welcomed it because it had been essentially what they wanted at the cost of relatively minor concessions.

Republicans leaders compromised, according to their own analysis, because they were faced with two choices: accept a Democratic bill or risk blocking court reform altogether at a time when they felt that the climate of opinion was for reform.

Democrats came to the aid of the bill in January with one big move to make good on the promise they had been floating through the years as a minority party in the Legislature.

They had to wait a long time for the chance, and they knew it

Rockville-Enron RHS Polio Clinic Said a Success

Dr. Joseph J. Kristan, town health officer, termed the polio clinic held at Rockville High School yesterday a "real success."

Of the 175 students who signed up, 135 appeared at the clinic yesterday. All of those who had requested shots appeared except about a half dozen absentees, according to Mrs. Alma Backlund, school nurse. There are 737 students at the high school.

Only 17 students returned slips stating that they did not want to be inoculated against polio, and another 17 stated that they planned to obtain the shots from a private physician. For 100 students the shot received yesterday was their first inoculation against polio. It was the third shot for 35 students.

Consent slips were distributed by the teachers to all students who raised their hands to indicate that they wanted the shot. At their desks, the students returned the slips, signed by their parents, indicating whether or not they were to receive shots at the clinic. Mrs. Backlund pointed out that those students who missed the clinic yesterday may obtain their first shot at the next clinic and follow it with a shot from their private physician within another two weeks. The third shot can be administered any time after an incubation period of 10 to 14 days. It will be within about two weeks of each other, the nurse said. A fee of \$1 was charged, but payment was not compulsory.

A second clinic is scheduled for June 17 or 18 at which Drs. Noel Levin and Allyn R. Danbeck will serve.

This Was D-Day—3 German Officer Tells Of Beachhead Attack

(Continued from Page One)
Our main forces lay 80 miles from the coast and we had to rush men to the beaches to combat the Americans, British and Canadians who stormed ashore.
From the first it was clear that the Allies had air superiority, more than the Russians had managed in the East. And the naval artillery on the Allied ships had greater range than our big guns. They could hit us while our shells fell far short.

Never during the war, including the dismal days in Russia, did I find the morale of our troops as low as it was in the first days of the Allied invasion.
I remember talking to our staff chief in those first invasion days and hearing him say with a defiant grin: "Let's take a Messerschmitt and go off to Spain."

On July 20, 1944, the plot to assassinate Hitler took place and failed. Word got around fast and we felt then that the war would last until we were driven back into Germany.

I remember the signs at the railway stations in the early days of the war. "The wheels must roll for victory!" The signs said.
After July 20, there was a new twist to that "Hasta roll for victory" of the other side.
Near us was one of Hitler's crack SS divisions. The morale in that division was much higher than that of the regular army divisions.

But in talks with officers of the division I was surprised to find so few dedicated Nazis. Several appeared to have more the morale of Medieval millitans than that of politically committed Nazis.
None of us thought in those days that a German economic miracle was just around the corner, that soon we would move from the devastation of defeat to the economic power of postwar Germany.

We fought hard, then. It is difficult now to explain why. We fell back slowly before the advancing American and British tanks.

On Aug. 11 we underwent a particularly severe attack. Most of the men of unit 154 were killed or taken prisoner. I was hit in the side by a tank machine-gunner and removed to a hospital in Holland.
When the Allies moved into Holland I was shipped back to Germany and eventually found myself in command of a newly organized artillery unit on the Eastern Front. I was in Czechoslovakia when the war ended in May 1945.

At the beginning of the war, Hitler had proclaimed: "Germany has grown larger." It wasn't very large now.

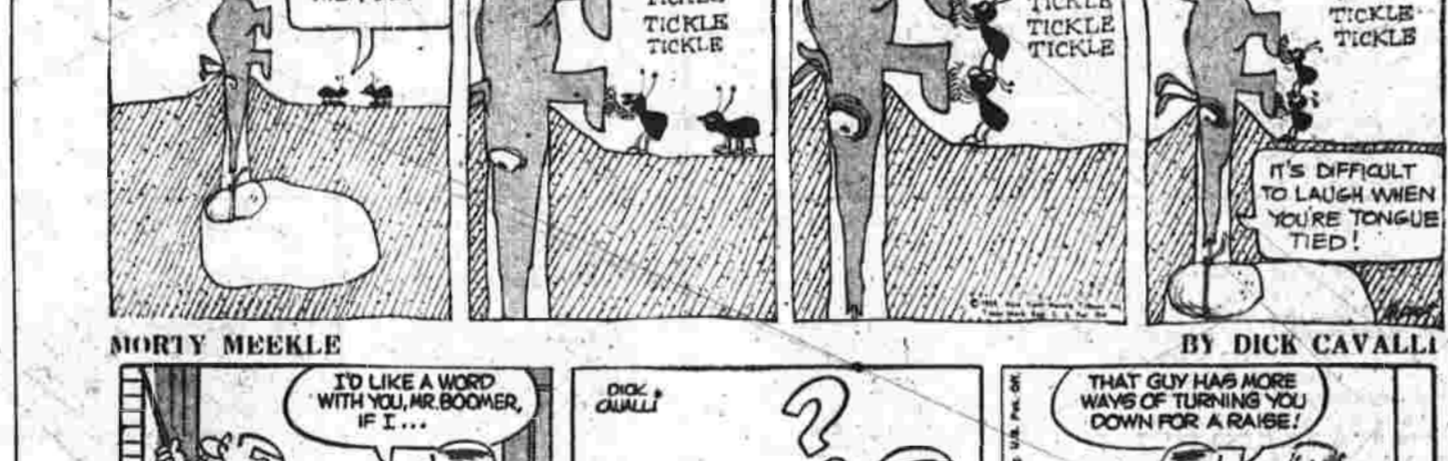
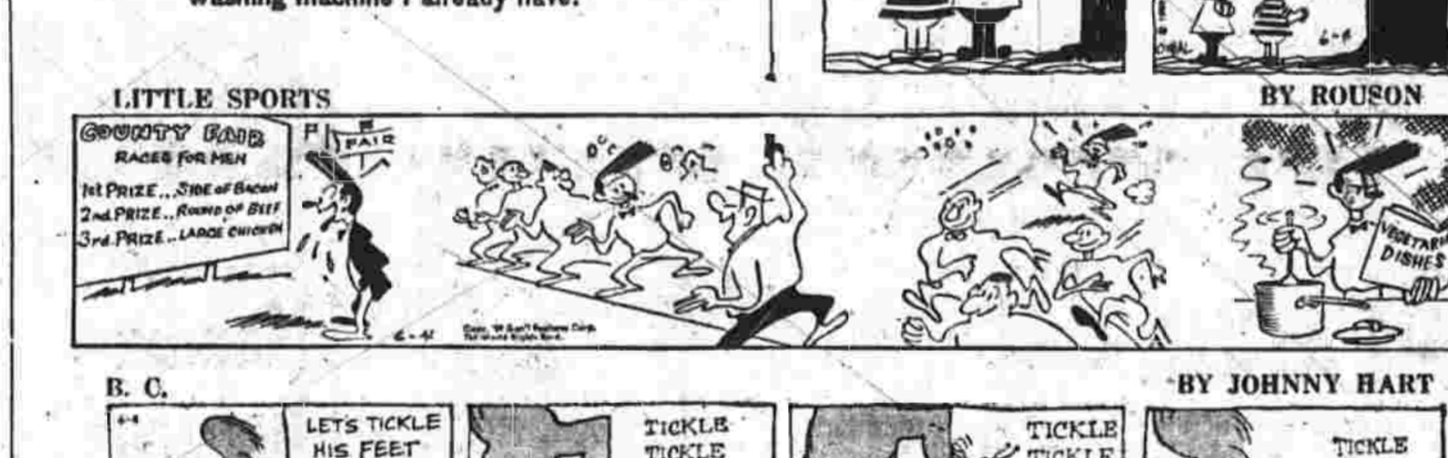
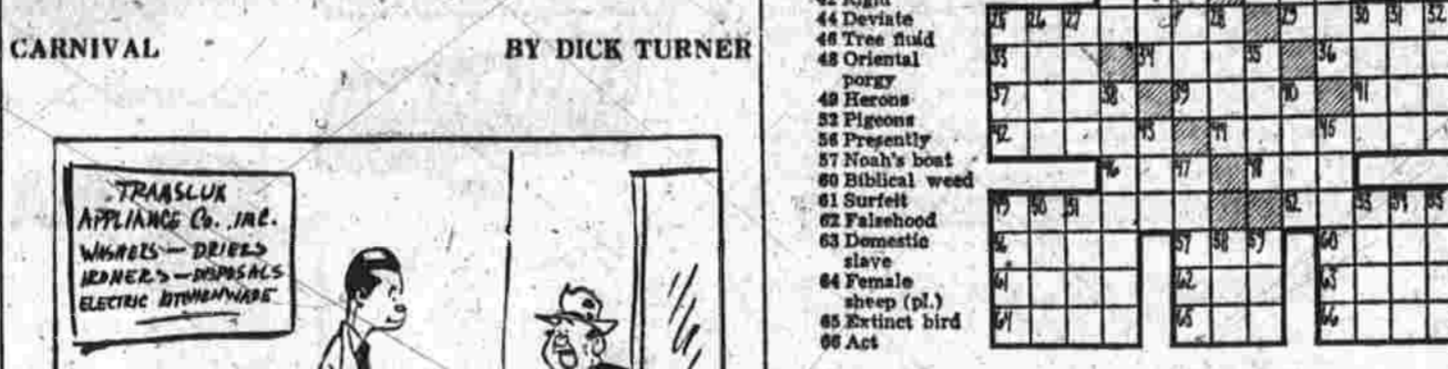

South Windsor Water Bills Await Ribicoff Signature

Two bills which would facilitate issuance of local "city" water lines have been passed by the State Legislature and sent to Governor Ribicoff for final approval.

Although need for the measures was not determined until the official deadline for filing bills had passed, Rep. Casey introduced them as they were favorably reported out of committee in time for final legislative approval.

Essentially Atty. Generalman will turn the measures over to the Board of Planning to be incorporated with the rest of the local water plan proposal. Actually, Rep. Casey said, they permit the town to choose either of two separate proposals.

The Conn. Water Co. plan calls for extension of its line along Rt. 5 and east on Sullivan Ave. to five St. An important feature is the additional proposal to put in a 12-inch main from Key St. to Avenue Rd. including the Wapping Grammar School and proposed extension along Rt. 5 to Sullivan Ave. and Rye St. at a cost of \$180,000.

A Metropolitan District Commission plan "contemplates installation of a 16-inch main from the present line along Rt. 5 to Sullivan Ave. and Rye St. at a cost of \$180,000."

Delinquents Like Being Delinquent

San Francisco, June 4 (AP)—Juvenile delinquents enjoy being juvenile delinquents, says the nation's top man in schooling.

"It's very difficult to get them to give up 'juvenile delinquency' once they've got started," Dr. Arthur A. Schick, chief executive of the Boy Scouts of America, told a 2-day conference.

But if they have a constructive program, as we feel we have, you can keep the numbers down," Schick said too much emphasis has been placed on juvenile delinquency because "people get the wrong impression when the 2 per cent are played up. The future depends on the 98 per cent who may not be of trouble."

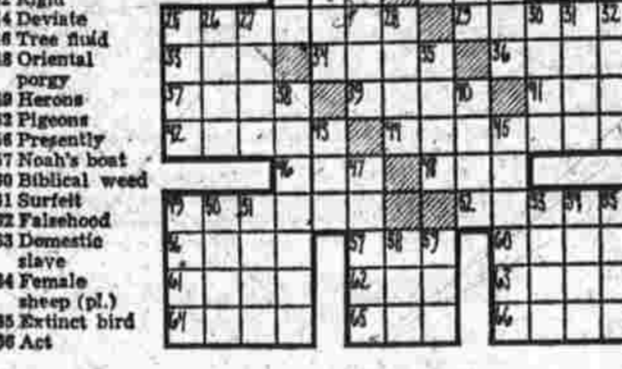

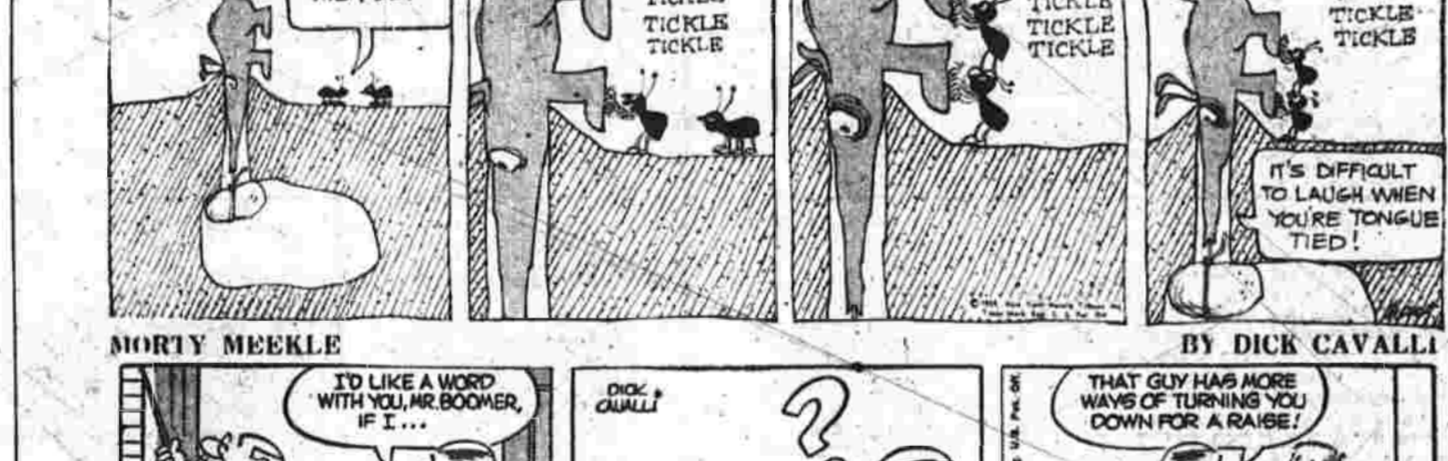
