St. Louis, June 10 (AP)—Both St. Louis daily newspapers were closed today by a strike of St. Louis newspapermen. The strike was against the afternoon Post-Dispatch. Materials and jurisdiction were involved in the complicated dispute. The union struck at midnight last night, forcing the morning Globe-Democrat to suspend publication. The Globe-Democrat's 2 a.m. edition wasn't published but the newspaper ran off all of its home editions by changing its schedule. Picket lines were set up at midnight. No negotiations were held last night.

The Newspaper Guild announced it would observe the picket line. Union printers were told that if they refused to cross the picket lines they did so as individuals, but that this was not a program under their contract. Local president Harry B. Russell said, "Federal Mediator Arthur Hale said last night the tempers are high and both sides need a couple of days to cool off before he calls another negotiating session." The dispute centers around a clause affecting the use of "straw" type material and mounting for advertising and news pictures.

A spokesman for the Pulitzer Publishing Co. said members of the Post-Dispatch and the Globe-Democrat negotiators agreed on a new contract. The contract was rejected by the union. The Post-Dispatch 41 journeymen, stenographers and three apprentices. In addition about 20 substitutes are called to work when needed. About 1,000 persons are employed by the two papers.

### Newest State Inspires Home Sewing Designs

AP NEWSFEATURES

The Hawaiian influence now moves into the home sewing field, producing wonderful, colorful casual clothes to wear at home or on the beach.

A bright new idea borrowed from the 50's state is a gay-colored tunic of quilted cotton satin, to wear at home with skinny pants or even on the beach for a swim-suit cover-up.

It's easy to make. Local sewing center experts suggest that you cut a piece of fabric for a sheath dress, and adapt it to the tunic look by adding the seams to the length, and making the sleeves short. Waistline starts can be adjusted for an easy fit.

It's important to select the correct binding for your tunic. Pina-cotton bias tape is best for fine fabric, bias binding, with such things as cotton satin.

A rose printed cotton satin tunic can use three shades of binding—pink, pink, and black. These three rows of tape can be ingeniously stitched so that no stitching shows on the outside.

Here's how to do it: Open one fold of the tunic (pale pink) bias binding, with a wide edge toward hem of garment and fold line approximately one inch from hem, stitch along fold line and allow tape to fold over naturally. Follow the same process for the crimson row of tape, catching the bottom of the pink tape in this second row of stitching. Repeat with the black tape. Finish by hand-stitching black tape in place on wrong side of garment.

### Your Pocketbook

Our argument ran thus: If we bring the car to the city, there are two alternatives: Garage it at \$40-plus a month or park it on the street. The latter means paying traffic violations at \$15 a clip plus moving the car daily to comply with parking regulations.

"Your time is worth more than that, my husband growled." (Yes, my town it could take an hour a day to find suitable parking space.)

This is more flattering than all the Mother's Day trinkets I could have received. But it also makes a good deal of sense.

It is not completely impossible to measure the economic value of a husband. Statisticians claim to know the ingredients. The number of years a man probably will work, current and projected conditions of employment and income, the survival rate of men, etc. The conclusion is that a man is worth about \$300,000 in his lifetime. (I don't quite agree with this because I claim a man, if he is a husband, has a certain inalienable extra value as a man.)

Reportedly, it is different when it comes to the economic contribution of a wife. Even if she works full or part-time, her total contribution to family and home can be only vaguely estimated. If she does not work at all, this contribution is certainly more difficult to pinpoint.

Figure what it would cost you to hire someone to clean, cook, packed, wash and iron, teach the children and sew buttons. Again, let's exclude the intangible ingredient of love with which these tasks most often are performed.

The cold bitter truth remains that in any well ordered scheme of things the contribution of the wife should be reckoned on in any family financial planning. Regrettably, I can cite a half-dozen instances in my own backyard where this contribution by the wife is no longer possible as a result of illness.

To guard against such tragedy, here is my advice: Wife insurance. Either you or your wife should buy some type of family income policy. Here is the economics of it:
