Collinsworth's wife cried out "O. Jesus" a few moments after the verdict was announced and began crying hysterically. Relatives of the other defendants wept.

Only Stoutamire's lawyer committed himself in advance to an appeal regardless of the severity of the conviction. The other lawyers said they wanted to await developments before deciding.

The victim, a slender thin-faced girl of 19, testified that the four youths, threatening her with a shotgun and a switch-blade kinfe, abducted her from a car where she was parked with her date and another Negro couple after a university dance. She said he was raped seven times while pinned to the ground for two or three hours.

Defense lawyers based their case upon a claim of consent. They presented testimony that at no time did the victim scream, struggle or try to dissuade the while youths.

presented testimony that at no time did the victim scream, struggle or try to dissuade the white youths. They said instead she offered to forget the rape if they would take her back to the college.

Florida Law prohibits publication of the name of rape victims.

The 4-day trial attracted worldwide attention as a test of southern racial justice. No white man ever has gone to the electric chair in Florida for raping a Negro.

In their closing arguments defense lawyers claimed the youths were being made "the whipping boys for racial anxieties of other people in other places.

"The fact that we have a racial situation here is a factor in this case." said Defense Atty. John

But State Atty, William D. Hopkins declared that the American form of government cannot sustain a double standard of justice.

"Law enforcement has got to be consistent," he said. "If we are going to convict under the same facts in another case regardless of the parties if we are going to have law enforcement and justice."

Hopkins ridiculed a defense claim of consent, He declared:

"These four great boys with two weapons—that poor little colored girl didn't have a chance, not a chance in the world. This thing is hardly human."

Hopkins didn't specifically ask for the death penalty but told the jurors it was up to them to decide whether to punish by the maximum penalty.

Defense Atty, Harry L. Michaels told the jury that since Hopkins didn't specifically ask the death penalty the state apparently felt.




