 The dilemma facing Connecticut Republicans as they entered the 1959 session of the General Assembly was their own eyes. In the past, they made no clear, intelligent decision as to their own eyes. They merely drifted into it, and if their drift led them to the unfruitful position most of the time, there are still two things to be said. First, they could have done much worse. If, for instance, they had been able to shake up their minds, and had made a clear decision in favor of nothing but savage political obstruction. Second, the alternative clear decision, which would have been for constructive cooperation all the way through, is something seldom achieved in politics. Although some observers thought Connecticut Republicans, in their political behavior, had done well to study the mood and techniques of Johnson at Washington, in his bond to the popular sense of failure, there is in us, must some day be expected.

**The Formula We Didn't Use**  
 It now seems fairly safe to pronounce the recession over. In fact, we seem to be on another span of very good times, in which both business and individuals will be making and spending money. In making the plea which resulted in these concessions, the President was voicing the hope that labor and management would get their inevitable eventual agreement without going through a shutdown of the industry. But it has not yet appeared that they are agreeing to postpone their showdown for two weeks, management and labor entertain any idea of negotiating in a manner which would bring a new contract without the dramatic gesture of a strike and lockout.

... And then there was one... Jerry and Ivan gave the girls their wrist corsages of white carnations. The girls bubbled. The flowers, they said, would look divine. They were so excited they couldn't cut the label holes in the boys' new suits where they would wear their carnations. Mrs. Moon cut the hole.

... Why? ... At Jerry Hill's house, things were jumping. He had been talking nothing but the prom for more than a week. Now, at

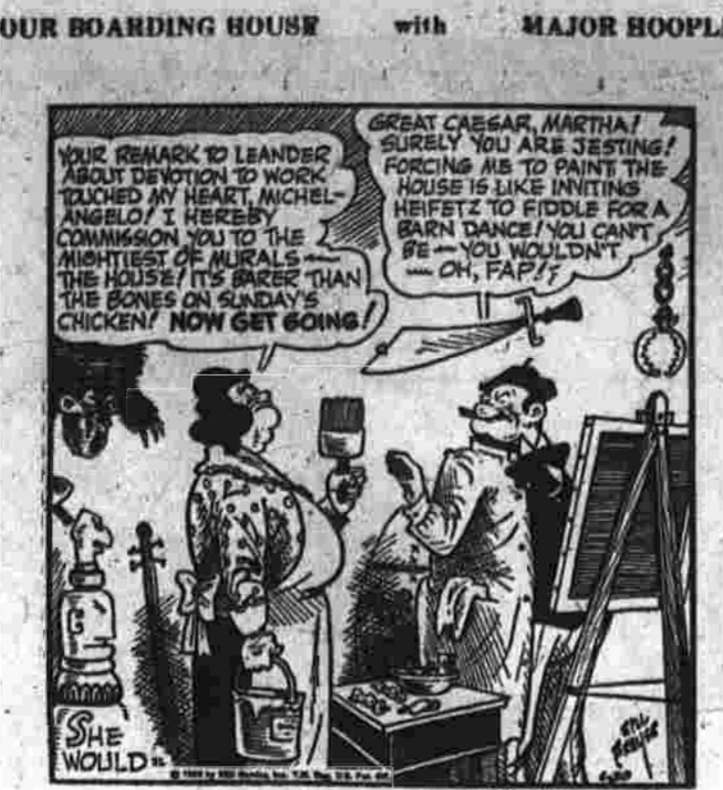

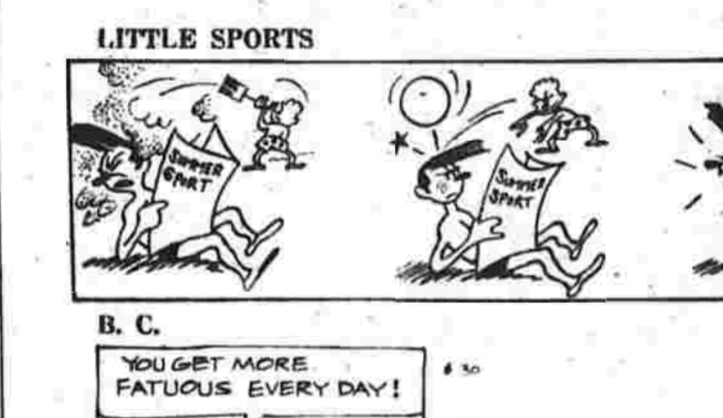

Police Increasing Thursday Patrols

The apparent increase in the number of patrolmen on Main St. each Thursday night is an illusion, according to Police Chief James M. Reardon, created by a stepped-up pace of patrols.

The explanation was prompted by questions of puzzled shoppers who said there seemed to be more men in blue in the shopping district during the last four weeks than ever before.

Regular and auxiliary patrolmen have been stationed on Main St. during Thursday's late shopping hours since the formation of the Auxiliary Police force and regular and supernumerary patrolmen patrolled the street many years before that. In earlier years stores were kept open late on Saturday nights.

Chief Reardon today said the only change has been the increase in the number of rounds requested of patrolmen.

Ordinarily there are five regulars and an unspecified number of auxiliaries on the beat. One patrol car is added to the beat as well.

After 9 p.m., when the stores close, the men are sent back to their regular patrols.

The heavy patrol is designed to discourage congregation on the sidewalks of crowds which often impede shoppers walking from

store to store. Double parking is prevented and use of the street and walks as weekly visiting areas is discouraged.

"The patrolmen are there," Chief Reardon said, "to ease traffic and parking problems and to keep the walks free for pedestrians."

"That's all there is to it," he said.
