But he warned that the Russian leader might "like to make a deal with a marked deck." "He probably would like to divide the world into two spheres of influence with a nice, big slice marked out for the Soviet Union." Johnson said. "But the American people are not going to make such a deal. We do not believe in a world divided into apheres. We be lieve in a world where people have a freedom of choice.

includes Hungary, Poland, East
Germany and other satellites, no one can say that this is a world o free choice."

The Senator said he was a firm advocate of talking instead of fighting wherever possible and thus believed in visits between the American and Soviet peoples.
