Washington, Sept. 2 (AP)-Sen. John F. Kennedy (D-Mass) reported today a con-struction site picketing snag had caused a sharp setback to hopes for quick final agree-ment on a labor bill. The 14 conferees trying to compro-mise Senate and House bills broke up with plans for a final settlement today appar-ently gone awry. But they agreed to meet again later in the afternoon.


