By Alfred Sheinwold U.S. Masters Toam Champion 'The "weak" two-bid, subject of all articles this week, shows a strong suit with very little outside strength. The hand is weaker than a normal opening bid. The weak bid may pave the way to a naving sacrification. paying sacrifice.
